MINING NOTES.

A. P. Churchill returned to the Bohemia mining camp Thursday.

He says the snow is rapidly disappearing in the mountains and that work will be renewed with a will this summer.

S. J. Brund came down from the Bohemia district last week, bringing with him specimens of a new find made at the Sweepstakes group a few days ago, which shows up remarkably well. One and a half pounds of this rock showed slightly over fifty cents worth of gold, and Mr. Brund does not hesitate to say that the new vein is one of the richest yet discovered in the Bohemia. He feels confident that the specimens brought out will go fully \$1,000 to the ton.
