WALL STREET FORCES AND THE GOVERNMENT

"The San Francisco Call says," "President Taft would save himself much annoyance and constantly recurring scandal affecting the conduct of his administration if he would quietly get rid of Ballinger and Wickersham. The public distrust of these men is overwhelming and every day they remain in the cabinet adds to the load that the president must carry.

These men know that they are the heavy load which the administration is packing, but they are not of the retiring sort and just as long as the president's good nature holds out they will stay in office. When they go, as sooner or later they must, it will not be with their own consent.

Mr. Wickersham wants the Republican party to go into the forthcoming campaign bound hand and foot and wholly committed in policy to the Aldrich crowd. Mr. Taft must be blind indeed to the condition of public sentiment did he not know that the course would amount to party suicide. Wickersham cannot read anybody out of the party. He is not endowed with powers of political excommunication, and this is fortunate, for the future of the Republican party rests with the insurgents."

Mr. Editor Leader:—
 A candid review of the relations existing between the present administration of the powers of the federal government and the financial, commercial and political forces operating from Wall street will disclose the incontrovertible fact that the attorney-general of the United States is the occult agent of a conspiracy to repeal the Sherman Anti-trust-act as applied to railroads.

This conclusion is fortified by the pending railroad bill before Congress, prepared by the attorney-general who is a creature of Wall street and who demands, with approval of Taft, that the provisions of the Sherman law making railroad combines a crime, shall be broken down and repealed. This demand originated in Wall street, the headquarters of all the criminal combinations in violation of the Sherman Anti-trust-law.

This demand is supported by the leaders in the Senate and approved by Taft as a part of his administration measures. If this be not a conspiracy between the forces of Wall street and the present administration, then it is impossible for malefactors of the gravest and most malign character, to conspire against the constitutional laws of this Republic. Nor is it less serious in its consequences, because it is the first demand that has ever been made since the late civil war for the destruction of the most sacred guarantee of protection of the rights of the people. Neither is it less heinous and reprehensible because it is the distinguishing policy of the present administration, in collusion with Wall street political forces, whose active agents are Aldrich, Wickersham and Cannon.

The pending legislation, known as the President's railroad bill is the most revolutionary piece of legislation offered in Congress since the days when the slave oligarchy ruled this nation. A piece of legislation fraught with greater responsibility, to the present administration, than the repeal of the Kansas-Nebraska-Bill, whose profound political importance was demonstrated by the fatal results of the late civil war, which drove the authors of that conspiracy into oblivion and totally wrecked their political party.

Be it remembered that no political party—that no president of the United States has ever before recommended just what the criminal railroad corporations have demanded. The administration forces have thrown off the mask which the president wore during the last campaign and now demands that his railroad bill shall be passed as his test of Republicanism, which sweeps aside the Sherman Act altogether, in so far as it prohibits the criminal traffic agreements on railroad rates and suppression of competition by public service corporations.

The Wickersham bill approved by Taft removes the impending danger to criminal corporations which violate the Sherman anti-trust-law and provides none of the adequate safeguards for the conservation of the rights of the people, as recommended by Roosevelt

and is therefore anti-Roosevelt and anti-Republican.

Were it not for the protest, argument and rugged appeal of the Insurgent members of the Senate and House, this monstrous conspiracy, inaugurated by the head and front of the greatest trusts and combinations in attendance at the National Convention which nominated the present Chief Magistrate and now clothed in the livery of an administration measure, would have been enacted into law.

The conduct of the administration leaders, measured by the legislative construction of their bill, adroitly framed, to lift the shadow of the penitentiary from the conspirators engaged in criminal practices, in violation of the law, shows how foul must be the motives which prompt the congressional enactment of their proposed measures.

The ignominious career of the administration, thus far is a repudiation of its tariff pledges and subversive of the rights of the people, as well as a repudiation of the teachings and precepts of Abraham Lincoln. It is a bold assault upon the fundamental doctrines of representative democracy, which demands equal and exact justice to all and special privileges to none.

The conflict between the Insurgents and the administration is founded upon the fundamental principles of justice and civic morality and can never be compromised. Either the administration, surrounded by councillors of special interest, barricaded behind the battlements of Wall street will rule this nation with a rod of iron or the emancipation of the people from the intolerable yoke imposed by political machines shall be accomplished by the restoration of our state and federal governments upon the foundations laid by Jefferson and Lincoln, against which the gates of hell shall not prevail.
