CORVALLIS BAR FOR JUDGE J. W. HAMILTON

Corvallis lawyers have joined the Lane and Coos county Bar Associations in an endorsement of Judge J. W. Hamilton, of Roseburg for another term as circuit judge. The Corvallis Gazette of June 23, says:

HON. J. O. WATSON IS OUT FOR CIRCUIT JUDGE

Hon. James O. Watson, the subject of this sketch, was born in Jackson county about forty years ago. He is the son of Hon. E. B. Watson, former Supreme Judge of the state of Oregon. He graduated from the Leland Stanford University, state of California, with distinguished honors. He was also a member of the 2nd, Oregon and served time in the war with Spain, where he distinguished himself for his bravery in the several battles fought in the Philippine Islands against the enemy of our country.

He is a splendid man, of fine ability, of superior qualifications and learning. He has the natural qualities that make a good judge.

An even temper, strong moral courage, unbiased, not prejudiced turn of mind, a quick thinker and a hard worker. He has the knack of turning off more work than two ordinary lawyers, and the speed with which he will dispose of court business when elected will not be slow.

He has the united support of the Douglas county Bar, and the people of the county want him for the next circuit judge, and will elect him to that position. He has friends everywhere. The Republican party of which he is a

member, will give him their united support and the Democrats have cast aside party lines and will largely support Mr. Watson for circuit judge because of his superior ability, even disposition, and gentlemanly bearing. He will be an honor to the office to which he aspires.

Two Assault Cases.

The trial is being held at Eugene today.
