DOUGLAS MAN'S REPLY TO LEADER'S EDITORIAL

Says Other Counties Should Keep Out Of Douglas County's Circuit Judgeship Fight.

Editor, Cottage Grove Leader
 Dear Sir:—I note the article in
 your paper to the effect that Judge
 J. W. Hamilton has filled the
 office of circuit judge to the satisfac-
 tion of the bar and the people
 generally, and that his decisions
 meet with but a small percentage
 of reversals in the higher courts,
 which article is designed to aid his
 re-election.

I desire to say that this article is
 misleading and give my reasons
 for the statement. Facts speak
 for themselves. The legislature of
 1905, p. 179 of the Session Laws,
 provided for a new Circuit Judge,
 which Lane county received. At
 the last legislature Coos county de-
 manded and received a new cir-
 cuit judge, who must reside south
 of the South Umpqua river and
 west of the Coast Range of moun-
 tains during his term of office.
 Judge J. W. Hamilton opposed
 both moves. Since then Judge
 Hamilton's field of official duty is
 confined principally to Douglas
 county, where he resides, and no
 one has noticed that the Douglas
 county Bar has endorsed him.

Many of his decisions have met
 with reversals. In 1900 I filed my
 suit to recover the purchase money
 paid for lands I tried to buy from
 S. Marks & Co., both partners of
 the firm having deceased, and the
 heirs contesting over the title to
 the estate, with H. Wollenberg,
 the principal creditor, as adminis-
 trator de bonis non. Judge J. W.
 Hamilton had been the attorney
 for one of the firm before his elec-
 tion to the judgeship in 1898. I
 was a poor farmer; Mr. Wollenberg
 was wealthy and so was S.
 Marks & Co. and well able to
 maintain law suits. In the first
 trial of the suit that followed, J.
 W. Hamilton decreed that I pay
 the balance of the purchase price
 or loose what money I had paid
 them, without decreasing that they
 give me a good deed for my mon-
 ey. I had to appeal or loose all I
 had put in. I appealed to the Su-
 preme Court and on May 3, 1902,
 that court modified his decree and
 ordered a good and sufficient deed
 to be given me upon payment of
 the balance of the purchase price,
 see Wollenberg vs. Rose 41 Ore.
 314. This gave me a new chance
 and I at once tendered them the
 balance of the purchase money
 and demanded a good deed as the
 Supreme Court had decreed. They
 tendered me a deed from H. Woll-
 enberg as admr. and the deed of a
 stranger to the deal who claimed
 to own the lands but some of the
 heirs defeated his claim in part in
 De'Bow vs. Wollenberg, 52 Ore.
 404. On this trial of the case
 Judge Hamilton again held against
 me, and decreed that I must take
 their deeds or be barred of all my
 rights, notwithstanding the fact
 that the title was in litigation, and
 that the deeds offered did not come
 from the heirs of S. Marks & Co.
 This decision put it up to me to
 appeal the second time or loose all
 my money, plus all my expenses
 of suit and their too. I was bare-
 ly able to do so and maintain my
 family, but I did, and obtained
 from the Supreme Court on Dec.
 12, 1904, a reversal throwing Woll-
 enberg's proceedings out of court,
 and permitted me to go on with
 my original suit filed in 1900. See
 Wollenberg vs. Rose, 45 Ore. 615.
 I then proceeded with my suit and
 on October 15, 1906, after nearly
 seven years of litigation, with two
 appeals to the Supreme Court, at a
 cost of upwards of \$1700, the jury
 returned a verdict in my favor for
 something over \$2000. The court
 allowed rentals against my de-
 mands for improvements when I
 was not in default under my agree-
 ment, which lost me about \$500,
 on the trial. There is another
 chapter to this case where they
 threw my father off the premises
 pending this long litigation.

With such large expense, time,
 and trouble, to protect my rights I
 am looser. It is such delays that
 has brought the courts into dis-
 favor with the common people.
 Justice is so administered that a
 poor man has the worst of it. If
 Douglas county does not want J.
 W. Hamilton for their judge the
 other counties should not be con-
 cerned. This is our fight and let
 us take care of the situation. Re-
 publicans can not do better than
 to support their ticket, whoever
 their nominee might be.
