WANTED A PORTLAND MAN.

The Daily Oregonian, which has hollered itself hoarse for a state assembly, is first to find fault and express its disfavor with the work of the republican state assembly, seemingly all because a Portland man did not receive the assembly nomination for governor. Hear the Oregonian's wail:

"The Oregonian will say that it deems the nomination of Mr. Bowerman for Governor not the best that might have been made. "THE COMMERCIAL CRIMES."

Against This Nation Will Ultimately Be Punished By An Amendment to the Constitution.

The time has come when the boundaries and partition walls of classes must be swept away before our courts and legislative tribunals by the powerful affinities of loyalty to government and love of justice and liberty or this stupendous fabric with all of its vigor of life and power will perish like the Roman Dominion from the pillars of Hercules to the Euphrates and Nile.

This nation had its gigantic birth in the cradle of political ethics fostered and nursed by the patriots who had faith in God and in the natural and inalienable rights of man and not in dollars and corporations, civic morality, engrained into the young and growing states of this Republic, by their founders, armed them with the most powerful weapons for resistance to the tyranny of kings and also placed within their hands that mighty lever by which this nation has been lifted to its exalted position among the powers of the earth.

Our national exaltation is the result of the active forces of righteousness slowly working out the evolution of a government of the people, by the people and for the people.

The empty fury of the cowardly and God-for-saken agencies of predatory wealth which proclaims itself to be the state, the law giver and the ruler of this Republic can destroy this government as it has destroyed all of the Republics of antiquity, but it never has and never can build a Republic or a state. Republics have been built and perpetuated only by people whose political constitution was composed of the vital forces of justice and morality working out from their initial union results of the first magnitude, holding in absolute subordination the material used by the constructive moral energy, inherent in the vital process which builds and perpetuates the imperishable state whose moral and civil right to rule and govern all forms of wealth and property is absolute and supreme.

Criminal combinations of corporate wealth recognize no restraint and will obey no law, their predatory agents have no moral combinations and defy the people to their teeth and point to their paid advocates in the senate, in the house and in the cabinet and with insolence and arrogance ask the people "what are they going to do about it." We own the political machinery of the state and nation and no reform measures in the interests of the people shall become a law.

Mr. Taft in his speech in Jackson, Michigan, recently declared that "popular government must be a government of parties,"—and by his theory of government as well as by the incontrovertible facts which distinguish his administration, we have reached an epoch in the history of our government when a minority "group" of politicians assembled in Wall street, "a group" which rules the party to which Mr. Taft belongs as it also manipulates his administration as an instrument of the party group, to rob, to pillage, and to plunder this nation in the interests of private property: all of which furnishes a demonstration of Mr. Taft's theory of government by party.

Our chief magistrate tells us "that the time has come in which it is necessary to lay down certain rules restricting and regulating the use of private property. No rebuke could be administered with greater severity to the president than his own confession that after forty years of unbroken rule by his party in power, it now becomes necessary to "lay down certain rules restricting and regulating the use of private property." It is well known to every intelligent citizen in this nation that such rules are laid down in our statutes where they have existed as the ready instruments for administering justice in the interest of all the people for more than a score of years, known as the Sherman-anti-trust law which the president is bound by his oath of office to enforce as such "necessary rule restricting and regulating the use of private property." Will our chief magistrate tell us why he has utterly failed to enforce those "necessary rules" and to adminis-

ter their criminal provisions for punishment of the notorious criminals operating from Wall street, criminals whose powerful agents are the directors of the policies of his party "group" in the senate, in the house and in the cabinet.

It would seem from reports published by the public press that the feudal princes of Wall street, has ordered Mr. Taft to scold the general alarm from Jackson, Mich., warning the people of the imminent peril, "socialism."

To which we reply that if "socialism" be a peril pray tell us who has done more than Mr. Taft to inaugurate a campaign of socialism in every state in the Union, a crusade for the utter extermination of the agents and emissaries of a political machine of which the Morgans, the Rockefellers and the Guggenheims are autocrats and rulers who have made Taft their ambassador to our people, who are vassals to their Commercial Plutocracy.

Mr. Taft called a special session of congress and undertook to solidify the Republican party in the interests of Wall street and gave the country his tariff monstrosity which split his party into what he calls "groups" and he now summons the nation from Jackson, Mich., to stand by his Wall street "group" which he calls the Republican party because he is the delegated leader and defender of the Aldriches, Cannon, Wickershams and the Ballingers.

Mr. Taft's zeal to solidify his party in the interests of the colossal industrial political-monopolies has paralyzed his moral vision and rendered him blind to the real perils to the government.

Our blind pilot fails to see the logical results of plutocratic administration, under the cover of which all of the chartered corporations, in collusion against the law are but the creatures of predatory wealth which are now in revolt against the sovereign authority of the people who must and will rule supreme or the state and nation must perish amid the ruins of a constitutional government. To this ignoble fate there is but one alternation, either all corporations and organizations of predatory wealth must obey the law, or their doom will be written in an amendment to the constitution, following the amendment which doomed a slave oligarchy to irrevocable destruction by the sovereign people who will make it duty of congress to condemn beyond the power of intervention of any feudal court and in case of conspiracy against the government to confiscate all property controlled and operated by corporations in persistent violation of the law and that such property shall be owned and operated by and in the interests of the people of the United States as a righteous retribution for monstrous felonies of the gigantic monopolies whose

opulent, aggressive and beligerent garrison can muster such commercial parasites, such moral bankrupts and such vernal political monte-banks as Aldrich, Cannon, Wickersham and Ballinger,—the despised rulers of an insolent political machine, a machine destitute of civic morality, courage and patriotism, a machine now administered by William H. Taft.

In view of the failure of the president to enforce and administer our anti-trust law, we predict that the sovereign people will amend our constitution and compel every worshipper of Mammon who counts his occult income by thousands and by millions to pay a just tribute to this government or surrender the last dollar of his criminal wealth. We predict also that the congregation of the political hypocrites shall be made desolate and that the fire of an incensed national sovereignty shall consume the tabernacle of bribery and political corruption as sure as God is marching on.

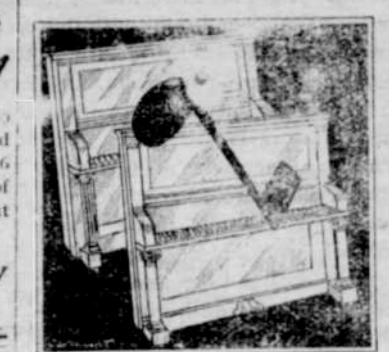
