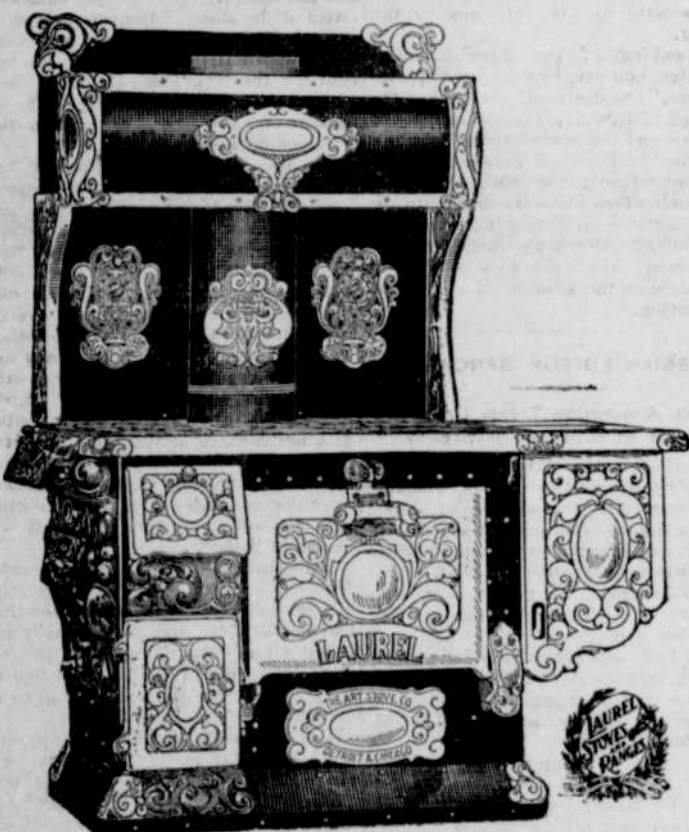

BOOSTING NESMITH COUNTY.

H. O. Thompson and Hon. O. M. Kem Nesmith county boosters from Cottage Grove, were in Brownsville Wednesday scattering literature and talking for the proposed new county, which is to be carved out of portions of Lane and Douglas counties. The gentlemen were on their way home from an auto trip down the west side to Portland and back on the east side, visiting all the towns enroute. Mr. Thompson informed the Times that the Nesmith county sentiment is growing rapidly all over the state and the new county would surely be created at the election in November. It is a meritorious measure and will receive a large vote in this section.—Brownsville Times.

HAS ANYBODY SEEN KELLY?

John W. Kelly, former editor of the defunct Douglas Leader, left for Gardiner and Scottsburg last week where he will spend a few days in the interest of the "wet" campaign.—Roseburg News.

Kelly is the fellow who recently gave Marshal Snodgrass a roast because he had the temerity to relate a few truths about Roseburg in his home paper. Kelly announced that the Leader under his management would vigorously oppose local option and state-wide prohibition, but as we predicted his journalistic effort was weak and brief. Roseburg mourneth not his demise.

The Leader notes that our esteemed townsman, Attorney W. C. Counter, has consented to allow his name to be used in connection with the Republican nomination for Justice of Peace of the Cottage Grove district, subject to the will of the people at the forth-coming primary election. Counter is a pretty good sort of a fellow, well qualified to fill the office, and worthy of any trust reposed in him. The only objection the Leader has to the fellow is that he is a foreigner, a Jayhawker born and bred. However, he has become naturalized and gives evidence of becoming a worthy, progressive and useful citizen.

H. O. Thompson and Hon. O. M. Kem returned home from their automobile tour of the Willamette valley and Tillamook county last Friday, which was made in the interest of Nesmith county. They traveled 661 miles and their trip will be productive of much good for the proposed new county. They were pleased with the encouragement offered on every hand. Another similar trip throughout another section of the state is being planned.

The first number of the Oregon Daily Democrat, Portland's new democratic newspaper, appeared Monday. It promises to fill a long felt want in Portland and this state and with its able management and good solid backing is sure to succeed. William H. Garland, a newspaper man of wide experience and recognized ability, is editor and manager of the new daily. Here's wishing it success.

The voters' pamphlet of measures to be voted on at the general election is in the hands of the state printer and will shortly be issued. It will contain 220 pages and will cost the state \$25,000 of which \$2,000 is paid by persons and organizations filing arguments for and against amendments.

We now have an ex-president who refuses to sink into oblivion. Teddy Roosevelt last week at Osawatimie, Kansas, gave his political creed, a good one. He stands for justice for the rich man and poor man alike and the punishment of wrong whenever or by whomsoever done.

NO MORE COASTING ON MAIN STREET.

The city council met in regular session Monday evening, all members being present except Aldermen T. C. Wheeler and W. A. Hogate.

A contract with the city was read and approved whereby Percy Rogers, Bert Willard and Ellis Robinson agree to deliver the rock from the city crusher to and along Main street for paving purposes at 37½ cents per yard.

A large number of rights of way contracts for the Lang creek pipe line were read, signed and ordered delivered to the respective parties.

The Mayor instructed Marshal Snodgrass to prohibit boys from coasting with express wagons on the Main street pavements.

The street commissioner was ordered to notify property owners to repair street corner curbs and plaster all unfinished curbs along Main street that the Warren Construction Co. might proceed without interruption with their paving contract.

Adjourned to Tuesday evening Sept. 6, Monday being a holiday, upon which business of importance could not legally be transacted.

Primaries September 24.

September 24 will occur the nomination primaries when all state and county officers will be nominated. But two political parties can be represented—the republicans and democrats. The socialists and prohibitionists will have to nominate by petitions. This is a provision of the primary law, which says that before any participate in the nominating primaries that party must have cast at least one-fourth of all votes cast for members of congress at the last general election. This does not place these political parties so excluded to any special disadvantage and they can get on the ticket by petition. During the nominating primaries no democrat can vote a republican ticket nor a republican a democrat ticket. Each must vote the ticket he is registered under or none at all.

Cottage Grove's Fine Fruit.

The largest petite prunes placed on exhibition in this city this season came from Jack Lewis' young town lot orchard and were presented to the Leader by Miss Lillian Lewis Saturday. They were as large as the usual Italian prune.

E. A. Wheeler brought in from his Silk Creek farm Thursday three pears resembling Bartlett's which measures standing here side by side ten inches in length or 3½ inches each in diameter. The three pears weighed 40 ounces.

Dan Beck presented some fine big sweet apples to the Leader Thursday. They are green in color with a yellow cheek and are a splendid eating apple. Our expert apple growers call them "Carolina Sweet." There does not seem to be any variety of apple, pear, peach, cherry, plum or prune, but what grows to perfection here, and with less labor and expense than in any other section of the state.

Max Dorwood brought some plums to the Leader office Monday which are different from any we have ever seen. They are very large and of such a deep dark red that they appear almost black. The meat is also red and excellent in flavor. The seed is small but the tree is not a heavy bearer. Mr. Dorwood has two full grown trees and they were labeled "Abundant Plums," but they do not answer the description of that fruit. They are Satsumas.

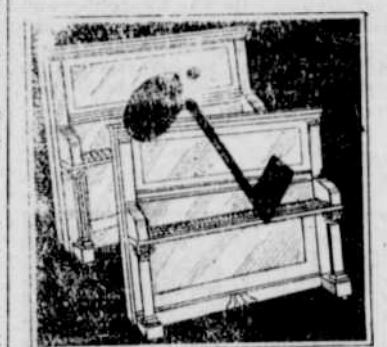
