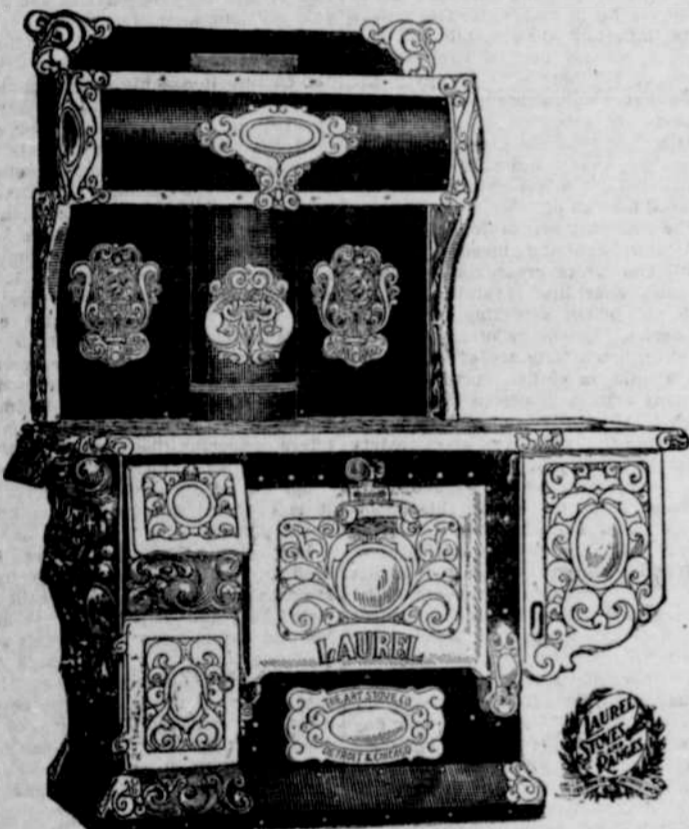
HOW THIS RANGE IS MADE

WORKING THE COUNTRY PRESS.

A pretty smooth scheme of the Greater Oregon Home Rule Association—saloon organization—is to subscribe for the various country papers for six months and whenever an item or editorial appears in their columns antagonistic to the association, Brother H. C. McAllister, who receives a princely salary to manage the booze or "home rule" campaign, and who poses as "general manager" of the Greater Oregon Home Rule Association, attempts to rush into print with a gallant defense of the criticism and thereby for a 75 cents subscription, get about \$50 worth of free advertising in the way of a full presentation of the question with their argument thrown in. This trick was tried on the Leader last week, but we have had something like twenty years experience in newspaper and campaign work and are not inclined to submit to such bold attempts to monopolize our columns by some blatant hiring of certain political combinations or interests without cost to them and without the acceptance, approval or indorsement of the paper's management. Nay, nay, Pauline! We are not so easy.

The burden of McAllister's argument is that "prohibition does not prohibit" and that more liquor is consumed in nation and state under prohibition regulations than under the former regime. If so, what is the liquor interests kicking about?

From a personal, selfish and monetary standpoint why do they not unite with the Anti-Saloon League and help make Oregon dry this fall and thereby boom business for the distillers and liquor dealers? It certainly looks queer and seems inconsistent that a combination of interests will organize to work against the increase, growth and success of their own interests. If we prohibitionists in dry territory are satisfied with the present conditions, though as favorable to the liquor interests as is claimed, certainly the other fellows should be. If the state of Oregon will show as many beneficial results and improved conditions socially, morally and financially by accepting state wide prohibition as did Lane county and Cottage Grove in accepting local option the innovation will be all that is claimed for it and all that could be desired. We are willing to give it a trial.

THE NESMITH AUTOMOBILE.

The "Nesmith Auto" is on the road again making more votes for the proposed Nesmith county. This time it will tour Southern Oregon and possibly go as far east as Klamath land. The indomitable H. O. Thompson, chaperoned by Andrew Br and will again tell the voters on this tour why they should vote for Nesmith and also distribute literature containing irrefutable facts concerning the creation of Nesmith. The auto headed south with Elvin Spray at the wheel Sunday, J. W. Wilson accompanied the party as far as Roseburg.

The Oregon State Fair, Salem, September 12-17, promises to have the most successful session in its history. Features never before incorporated will be seen this year by state fair visitors, and these are generally of a high order. There have been many improvements made to the grounds and buildings, a new water system installed, with new barns for stock and added accommodations for race horses. The string of horses listed for this year will probably be ahead of the racers heretofore appearing on the race grounds.

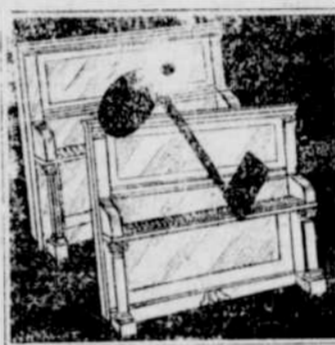
