LATE INVENTIONS.
 A draining rack for wet dishes, to be hung on one side of a dishpan, is a new convenience for the housewife. It is claimed for a new electrical melting pot for glue that it keeps its contents at a perfectly even temperature.
 An improved cover for street manholes, recently patented, screws into its socket so that wagons cannot knock it out of place.
 A new tool for painters consists of a reservoir for paint, which is fed out upon an embossed roller to stripe flat surfaces or to apply ornamental designs.
 For thawing dynamite a metal kettle has been invented in which the explosive is placed in an inner compartment, which is surrounded by hot water.
 About the size of a lawn mower is a new machine designed to sow lawn grass seed, disks cutting into the earth receive the seed, which is covered by a following roller.
 A single turn of the handle of a new letter stamping machine cuts a stamp from a strip, moistens, and affixes it, registers the transaction, and ejects the stamped letter.
 A double frying pan, hinged in the center, has been patented by an Iowa man, so that two articles can be cooked at once and to save space by folding it when not in use.
 To test the speed of projectiles driven by modern high power explosives British scientists have perfected a chronoscope which measures time to the millionth of a second.
 A new range employs both electricity and steam, a current of the former, used to cook food on the top of the range, also heating water to produce steam to operate the oven economically.
 A new shoe salesman's stool is provided with small mirrors on each side of the foot rest, to enable the customer to get side views of a shoe he is trying on and also to afford a degree of privacy.

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IN THE LIMELIGHT

TO HEAD MONEY HEPTARCHY



J. Pierpont Morgan, Jr., whom Thomas Ryan says is to head an American financial heptarchy, recently has been visiting some of the vast property interests to which he is to fall heir. Young Morgan marveled at the huge steel plants in Pittsburgh—a part of the United States Steel corporation—the trust—which is controlled by his father. He also visited the mills at Gary, Ind., which are growing so rapidly, and found much to ponder over there.

Although the impression is far from general, young Morgan is in many ways much like his father. He may not have the latter's organizing genius; that remains to be seen. But he has the dominating personality and aptitude for business that made the elder Morgan even a decade ago and before he crowned his organization exploits with the formation of all industrial combinations—the United States Steel corporation—such a towering figure in the financial world. And for years the younger man has taken an active part in the affairs of both the London and New York houses of J. P. Morgan & Co. But it was not until a year ago that J. P. Morgan, Jr., entered the domain of corporate finance and management.

GORST EGYPT'S REAL RULER



The famous speech which Col. Theodore Roosevelt made in London, following the one which he made in Egypt, has attracted attention to that country, and to Sir Eldon Gorst, British agent and consul general in Egypt, who was the real ruler in that part of John Bull's domain.

Sir Eldon Gorst succeeded Lord Cromer in Egypt a little more than three years ago, but previously he had had much experience in that country. He first went to Cairo in 1886 as an attaché and has been promoted gradually to his present position. The criticism against him is that he is too conciliatory; that he has not been sufficiently firm in dealing with the Nationalist press which even goes so far as to advocate assassination of the British government representatives. He is a native of New Zealand and is forty-nine years of age. Recently Sir Edward Grey, foreign secretary in the British cabinet, elected Gorst and his administration of Egyptian affairs, but in spite of this Gorst is to be replaced by Sir Arthur Hardinge, cousin of the newly-appointed viceroy of India. There is an effort to make it appear that the Roosevelt speech had nothing to do with Gorst's removal, but the people generally accept the idea that the government is taking the ex-president's advice and will rule in Egypt with a curb bit in the future.

OLD GUERRILLA CHIEF OUT



Col John S. Mosby, the famous Confederate guerrilla of Civil war days has lost his position as a special attorney in the department of justice, after eight years there.

In the absence of Attorney General Wickersham no explanation was made at the department. Old age, that nightmare of superannuated government employees, it is understood, was the main reason for the dismissal.

RAIL CHIEF HAS A SCHOOL



H. E. Byram, vice-president of the Burlington system, has been teaching school in St. Louis. Naturally it is a railroad school and notable for the fact that the occasion was the first upon which the man who recently shouldered the responsibilities of operation of the Burlington System had been in St. Louis.

From the time Mr. Byram left the Chicago headquarters he became a peripatetic pedagogue—a traveling teacher as it were—for he is going all over the Burlington System, meeting members of the operating and traffic staff at division and district headquarters and holding little educational meetings.

BIG DEMAND FOR DAIRY COWS.

Dairymen Report it impossible to Purchase First Class Animal For Less Than \$80 Per Head.

The great demand for dairy products has caused the price of good dairy cows to be very high. Reports from associations of dairymen show that it is impossible to buy first-class dairy cows at even \$80 a head. With such a demand for cows in old dairy districts, there will be few good cows moved into new dairy territory. So, the only way new districts can be supplied must be by breeding up the common stock by the use of good dairy bred bulls.

If good dairy cows could be sold for \$40 to \$50, at least 5,000 could be sold in Colorado within the next year. But the prices as above quoted are prohibitive. So, only the culls from the old dairy districts are likely to be sent here for sale.

NEW LAW PROTECTS GROWERS.

The provisions of the Wisconsin state nursery law, which was passed in June, 1909, if generally observed, will greatly benefit the fruitgrowers of the state, according to Prof. J. G. Sanders, state nursery inspector of the College of Agriculture of the University of Wisconsin. The law prohibits the sale of uninspected plants or trees, or any other kind of nursery stock by an unlicensed person, whether the original owner or an agent. Shipments of uninspected stock into the state are prohibited, the law requiring that all such shipments be officially inspected.

All growers of trees and plants who desire to offer them for sale must secure a certificate-license good for one year, at a cost of \$10. Tags are furnished by the state inspector, and must be attached to each package of trees or plants sold. All agents selling trees within the state must obtain and carry at all times a duplicate agent's license like the original issued to the firm which they represent. These agent's licenses cost \$1.

Use of Ducks.
 Do not be constantly drugging your live stock with the idea that something is wrong with their health. When convinced that the animal is out of condition and that medicines are needed have a veterinarian prescribe the medicine and give it under his direction. Much harm can be done by the constant use of condition powders, as they usually contain drugs having diuretic properties. As a consequence the kidneys become accustomed to stimulation, and when the medicine is stopped the kidneys, not having the accustomed stimulant, become sluggish and inactive, and consequent ill condition of the animal "flows."

Sand For Ducks.
 Some people have a notion that ducks and geese do not need grit because they are not seen picking up large particles of stone. They do not need as large a size of grit as hens do, for they get sand when puddling in the bottom of the creek and streams where they forage for weeds and fish. Ducklings should be provided with plenty of sand, which takes the place of grit. So thoroughly do some duck raisers believe in grit that they mix sand in the feed that they give their young ducks.

Cleaning Up Bugs.
 Remember that young turkeys must have animal food in the shape of grasshoppers and bugs, and this is their big harvest month.

Use of Separator.
 We make butter and think it pays much better than selling milk. We only have to take our butter to market once a week, while, if we sold our milk, we should have to go every day, and now we have our skim milk and buttermilk for pigs and chickens, and have all the cream we want and make as much money as if we sold milk. We have a tubular cream separator, barrel churn and a butter worker, says a writer in an exchange. We make about 180 pounds of butter a month from eight cows and we average over 32 cents for our butter the year round to private customers.
