#### Welcome Their Pastor.

A most pleasant and cordial reception was tendered to Rev. Robt. Sutcliffe and family, at the M. E. church last Friday evening by the membership, upon the occasion of their return to this charge for another year by the recent Methodist Conference. The head of each department of the church gave a fine report and each extended a cordial welcome to Rev. Sutcliffe and family, after which splendid refreshments were served.

Following are some of the things accomplished by this church during the past year.

For ministerial support \$1550, benevolences \$400, district superintendent \$121, for bishop \$19, conference claimants \$37, education \$73, total not including pastors salary \$650. Paid out, S. S. expense \$100, church expense \$200, on old debt \$150, alterations \$60, furnishings \$40, paper parsonage \$20, painting church \$125, incidentals \$200, total \$890, or a grand total of \$3,095. A fine concrete walk and platform was also recently laid in front of the church. New organizations, two bible classes, home missionary society, cradle roll, orchestra, Brotherhood, Additions to church 91, net gain after deaths and removals 56. The lighting capacity of the church has just been doubled. This is a grand showing and a source of great satisfaction to this church, both pastor, and membership.

The annual Teachers Institute for Lane county will be held in the high school building in Eugene, Oregon, Oct. 17, 18, 19, 1910. The sessions will begin at 9 o'clock.
