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HURRAH FOR NEWPORT!

During his sojourn at Newport, Contractor George Lea, who has just completed a water system for that city, never lost an opportunity to say a good word for Nesmith county. The genial and progressive editor of the Newport Signal, is one of Mr. Lea's converts and in the last issue of his paper, he says:

VOTE "YES" FOR NESMITH COUNTY

For the best interests and development of the state the proposed county of Nesmith should be created and should receive the sanction of the voters at the coming election. The territory is ample, the population is sufficient and the two counties of Lane and Douglas—from which the new county will be formed, will each have sufficient domain left for an empire. For years the people living within the boundaries of the proposed new county have been put to much inconvenience and great expense in reaching and transacting business at their respective county seats, and the mileage fees of the sheriffs and other county officials of Lane and Douglas counties have been heavy items in the annual county tax budgets. The contour of the territory makes the item of time an important element for the bulk of the people residing in the proposed county to reach either Eugene or Roseburg.

THE RIGHT MAN.

The editor of the Creswell Chronicle, who is familiar with Judge Hamilton's work and record in Coos county, says:

"On the democratic ballot appears the name of J. W. Hamilton candidate for re-election as judge in the Second Judicial district. Judge Hamilton has for years been a resident of Roseburg and has presided on the bench in the Second district, which includes Douglas, Coos, Curry, Lane, Benton, and Lincoln counties for several years. He is a man whose keen judgement and knowledge of law has made him one of the best known judges in Oregon. For years he presided over courts in Coos county, where his decisions were many and always just, and his friends in that section include all his acquaintances. During his many years on the bench practically all of his decisions have stood when taken to the higher courts. He has always received the votes of democrats and republicans alike because voters, regardless of party know and realize his worth in the position he occupies."

Sheriff Harry L. Bown has made an efficient, capable and faithful official during his administration of the office of sheriff, and should be rewarded for his good deportment and record by re-election on November 8th. Vote for Sheriff Bown.

When you mark your ballot at the polls November 8, be sure and place an x mark before the name of J. W. Hamilton of Douglas, and John S. Cook of Coos, for circuit judge of their respective districts.

I. H. Bingham, who was defeated in the primary election by L. E. Bean for nomination for joint senator, Linn and Lane, has come out as an independent candidate for the place and signs Statement No. 1. As a candidate before the primaries Mr. Bingham was, evidently, not willing to abide by the decision of the voters at the primary nor willing to accept the will of the people under peoples' rule in naming a candidate for joint senator and now, by taking Statement No. 1, hopes to influence enough democratic votes to insure his election.

If prohibition does not prohibit, as is claimed, and more liquor is sold as the area of prohibition extends, why are the liquor interests not jubilantly in favor of prohibition? Why do they not urge that Oregon shall go dry, and Washington go dry, and all other states go dry? If prohibition does not prohibit in a very great measure why this fight against prohibition? The people may answer this question for themselves and be trusted to vote right.

If the people finally manage to secure control of the republican party it need not be a matter of surprise if the interests will speedily turn their love toward the democratic party and work unitedly for that party's success. The interests are not at all partisan so long as they are protected, though they will urge republicans to stand steadfast and true as long as that party is doing what they consider the right thing.

Country voter, you will have to pay the costs of your criminal courts, of your jails, of board of prisoners coming out of crimes caused by licensed saloons in the towns and care of the poor coming from the use of liquors, and yet you have not a word to say about it. If the Greater Oregon Home Rule amendment, offered by the liquor men, should by any mistake be adopted, your vote is gone, so far as the liquor business is concerned.

If Ike Bingham is the best the Eugene Guard and Democrats of Lane can put forth as "anti-assembly, statement one candidate for joint senator of Linn and Lane" after he was kicked out of the republican camp in the late primary election, the Leader gives notice that it is for the assembly or any thing else to defeat this political slayer, I. H. Bingham.

Oregon has a good law against theft, but there is lots of stealing that goes unpunished. The law against thievery is a failure and should be prohibited. This argument is just as sensible as that advanced by the average anti-prohibition orator.

COTTAGE GROVE BOY WINS A FIRST PRIZE

Early last spring a notice was posted on the bulletin board drawing the students attention to the prizes offered by the Oregon Conservation Society for the best essays on the resources of Oregon. The contest was open to all regularly enrolled college and university students throughout the state and it is with extreme pleasure that it can now be announced that three of the prizes were taken by OAC students. Miss Lillie Dobell, '12, won the second prize of \$50 for the next best essay on the subject of Forestry. John Cooter, '13, of Cottage Grove, won the first prize of \$75 for the best essay on Soils and Morris Koon, '12, won the second prize of \$50 on the same subject. To win these prizes required extensive research work and many extra hours of hard labor, yet each of the prize winners declare that the benefit derived from their labors has been worth a great deal more than the mere prize received. To win these prizes did not merely require a knowledge of the subject, but the composition, punctuation, form, style, English, spelling and neatness all entered into the consideration of the judges. Furthermore each essay had to contain 5000 words and each of the contestants claim they were so thoroughly prepared on the subject that it was difficult for them to remain within this limit.—O. A. C. Barometer.

Abuse of the Initiative.

It is a gross abuse of the rights guaranteed by the Initiative and Referendum Amendment to the Oregon Constitution to bring up woman suffrage at every general election. This measure was submitted in 1900 and beaten by a plurality of 2137. In 1905 it was again proposed and was beaten by 10173. In 1908 it was again on the ballot and it was beaten by a majority of 21649. Notwithstanding these repeated defeats, more decisive at each election, the same measure is again on the ballot this year. The ballot is misleading and indicates a proposal to give votes to taxpaying women only, but the measure to be voted on is the same proposition which the people have so often and so recently condemned. It should be voted down this year by an increased majority, especially because of the fraud undertaken to be perpetrated on the people by the use of a false and misleading title on the ballot.

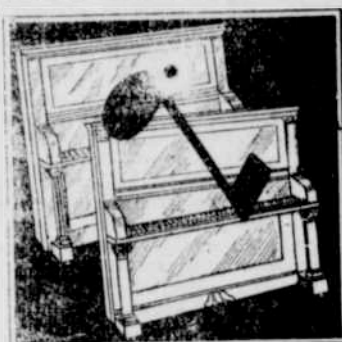

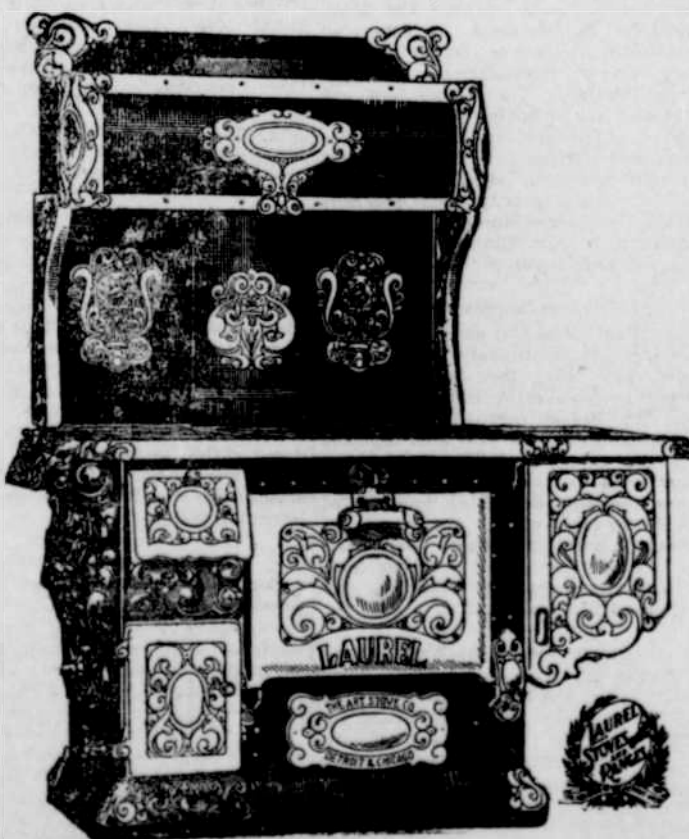
