BUSINESS METHODS AND GOOD ROADS CANDIDATE'S PLEDGE

This communication is for the purpose of calling your attention to the fact that I am an anti-assembly, independent candidate for the office of county commissioner.

I favor lower taxes, better roads and a business administration of the county affairs.

I contend that our taxes, levied for county purposes, are too high when measured by results obtained and I believe that they can be lowered by a judicious expenditure of the people's money.

In 1905, there was collected in this county, for state and county taxes, \$177,000.00. This year our state and county taxes amount to about \$290,000.00 on an assessed valuation of \$22,000,000.00. I am advised that for this year the assessment will be increased about sixty per cent and will be at least \$36,000,000.00.

If present methods prevail much longer we will eventually be taxed out of existence.

I am an earnest advocate for good roads and of liberal appropriations for building and maintaining them because I consider good roads the best asset a county or community can have.

In order to have good roads we must discard antiquated and slipshod methods and adopt a modern and scientific system of road-building.

I favor the appointment as road supervisors of men of recognized ability in road building; men who will treat all parts of their districts fairly, and who will demand and exact full value of every dollar expended.

I am opposed to favoritism in all forms, and, if elected, will serve all sections of the country with absolute fairness.

If you want a square deal and a business administration of county affairs, kindly give me your support.

Many times have these dirty skunks, at the midnight hour raided local poultry-houses and robbed them of rare fowls which have been imported into this section at a great expense to their owners, that these thieves might gorge their worthless carcasses therewith. No later than last Saturday night two of these cowardly curs stole into the poultry house of the writer and carried away a rare male bird received recently from a large Minnesota breeder and valued at no less than \$10. A bank-robber is a gentleman as compared to the low down specimen of depraved humanity, the chicken thief, who will sooner or later come to grief in this community.
