Augustus C. Jennings anti-assem-
bly independent candidate for county
Treasurer is still a candidate for the
following reasons:

Three days before the Primary
Election, a copy of his statement
to voters, was furnished to the
"Register" to be published on
Sept. 22-23 in daily and semi-week-
ly. The issue of the 22nd con-
tained but a part of it, omitting
the statement that I was a Direct
Primary (anti-Assembly) candi-
date, also omitted the office to
which I aspired. Other gross er-
rors rendered the article valueless.
The Editor made correction in the
proof the morning of the 22nd but
instead of being corrected was
omitted entirely from the daily and
the blundering article of the 22nd
was reprinted in the semi-weekly of
the 23rd.

Being thus deprived of making
my statement to the republican
voters, and the further fact that
owing to the County Fair being
held on primary day, many voters
in the country precincts did not
vote at all, being only about one
fourth of the registration, Eugene
casting nearly half the vote of the
county, giving its Assembly candi-
date a heavy vote. Notwithstand-
ing these facts if the Eugene vote
was left out I would have had a
majority of 73 in the county at
large. Concluding that I had been
wronged—no doubt unintentionally
by the Publisher—I appeal to the
voters and especially to the very
large number of republicans, tem-
perance men and independents,
who from any cause failed to vote
at the Primary election, for their
support at the polls on Nov. 8.

Judge John S. Coke.

The following letter from Dis-
trict Attorney George M. Brown is
self-explanatory:

Roseburg, Ore., Oct. 20, 1910.
Hon. A. F. Stearns, Oakland, Ore:
My Dear Judge:—Referring to
your inquiry concerning the laws
creating three judgeships in the
Second Judicial District and touch-
ing the ability and integrity of
Hon. John S. Coke, I have this to
say:

The Second Judicial District is
the largest Judicial District in the
State and comprises the counties of
Benton, Lincoln, Lane, Douglas,
Coos and Curry. The law provides
for three Circuit Judges for this
District.

The law also provides that "One
of said Judges shall reside south of
the Umpqua river and west of the
Coast range of mountains during
his term of office;" this provision
is equivalent to saying that during
his term of office one of the Judges
shall reside in Coos or Curry coun-
ty, because these are the only two
counties south of the Umpqua river
and west of the Coast range of
mountains.

While the law does not expressly
state that one of the candidates
shall be elected from Coos or Curry
counties, yet it is fair to assume
that the spirit of the law contem-
plates that one of the Judges elect-
ed shall, at the time of election, be
a resident of Coos or Curry county.

It is fair to the people of Coos
and Curry county to elect one of
their residents as Judge.

When the Legislature enacted
the law creating the third judge-
ship of the Second Judicial Dis-
trict, the Governor of Oregon se-
lected a resident of Coos county
for the appointment. He appoint-
ed Hon. John S. Coke, who has
been a resident of Coos county for
more than thirty years; a lawyer
who had practiced his profession
within the bounds of Coos county
for nearly twenty years. After
Judge Coke had been tried out as
Circuit Judge, following his ap-
pointment in February, 1910, the
people of Coos and Curry counties,
by an overwhelming vote in the
primary election, expressed a wish
that John S. Coke be elected as the
Judge to reside in Coos or Curry
county. The wishes of the people
of the Coast counties should be re-
spected. Personally, I have known
Judge Coke for seventeen years,
and have known him to be a man
of integrity, ability, learning, and
he will make one of the best Judges
that ever presided in a Court of
Justice within the state of Oregon.

The people who know him best
admire him most. You have a
right to vote for two judges at the
coming November election and one
of your votes should be cast for
Coke. Yours very truly,

MR. WEST AT COTTAGE GROVE.

years the Oregon railroad commis-
sion has done more for the shippers
and the public than was ever done
by any railroad commission in any
state in the same length of time.
When the track on the Corvallis &
Eastern railroad was reported un-
safe West took no man's word as
to its condition, but journeyed
afloat and alone the entire length
of the line and personally examined
every tie, every siding, every cul-
vert and every bridge. Vigilant
ever to duty and mindful always
of the safety of the public, he
walked the whole length of the
West side railroad from Corvallis
to Portland, cutting into ties, dig-
ging into bridge timbers enroute to
satisfy himself as to the safety of
its track. There have been few
instances in which the traveling
public has known a public official
so unreservedly concerned in its
safety and welfare.

It is a splendid record. West's
is a career, private and public,
that is a guaranty. It is a lifework
about which there is no doubt, and
of the meaning of which no man
raises question.

As a man, the former butcher's
boy has become skilled in law, well
rounded in education, polished in
the manners of the world and a
person of large affairs. Sometime
ago, he was admitted to the bar,
and his first effort was a case con-
ducted against the Southern Pa-
cific, in which the State won. He
studied law and studied books of
science and literature when other
men slept. His growth in affairs
is testimony of what the lad in the
lower walks can do if he only has
the vim, nerve and grit.

The former butcher's boy has
been named for Governor. It is a
beautiful incident in that it reveals
how in American citizenship the
highest office is open alike to the
low or high. It is a magnificent
country that public makes prefer-
ment not a question of rank, but of
manhood, purpose and genius. It
is a transcendent testimonial to our
American life, to raise such men
to high position.

It did not stand in the way of
Lincoln to the presidency that he
was only a rail splitter. Nor did
it disparage Garfield in the eyes of
the people that he was once the
driver of a canal boat. Nor does
it dim the lustre of Grant that he
was once only a tanner. Give the
Oregon boy who was once a deliv-
ery boy the chance he deserves,
and has fairly earned.—Portland
Journal, Oct. 2, 1910.

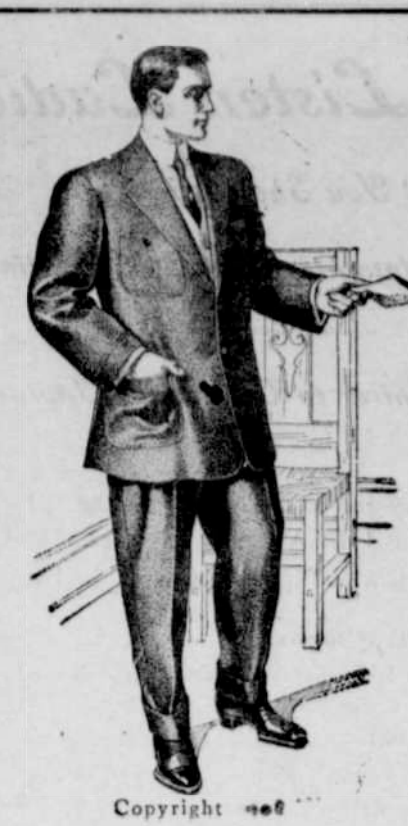
