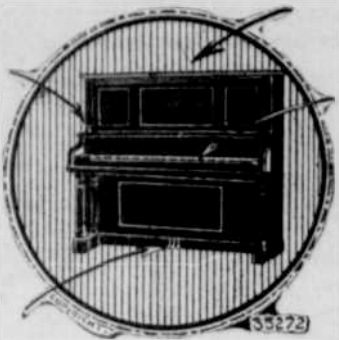

POULTRYMEN ELECT OFFICERS

Will Hold Third Annual
Show Dec. 6-9, 1911
Cottage Grove

Members of the local poultry
association, all of whom are
breeders of fine poultry in this
community, assembled at the
Leader office last Thursday even-
ing and an enthusiastic meeting
was held. The first order of busi-
ness was the election of officers for
the ensuing year, which resulted
as follows: President, H. K. Met-
calf; vice, Attorney A. H. King;
secretary, W. C. Conner; treas-
urer, Mrs. Jas. Benson; superin-
tendent, D. B. Chamberlen; assist-
ant superintendent, C. F. Walker;
executive committee, H. K. Met-
calf, W. C. Conner, Mrs. J. S.
Benson, J. H. and A. C. Spriggs.
The question of holding another
big poultry show in the fall of this
year was discussed at length and
upon motion it was unanimously
voted to hold the Third Annual
Show of this association in Cottage
Grove, December 6-7-8 and 9, 1911.
The matter of securing a judge
was discussed, upon which ques-
tion the members were divided,
some favoring the employment of
an eastern judge, others a Pacific
Coast judge. This matter will be
settled by vote later.

The secretary was instructed to
have printed application for mem-
bership certificates, and every
member was voted a committee of
one to secure new members, in-
cluding not only poultry raisers
but all those interested in the in-
dustry.

The membership fee is \$1.00 with
semi-annual dues of 50 cents June
1, and 50 cents January 1 of each
year. Besides the information and
benefit obtained at regular monthly
meetings, members receive a one-
half entry fee at all local shows.
The membership at present num-
bers about 20 and an effort will be
made to increase it to 50. The
next regular meeting will be held
February 2, at the Leader office.
The poultry business is increasing
rapidly here and is becoming a
prominent factor in the revenue
producing industries of this com-
munity. Cottage Grove is the
"Petaluma of Oregon."

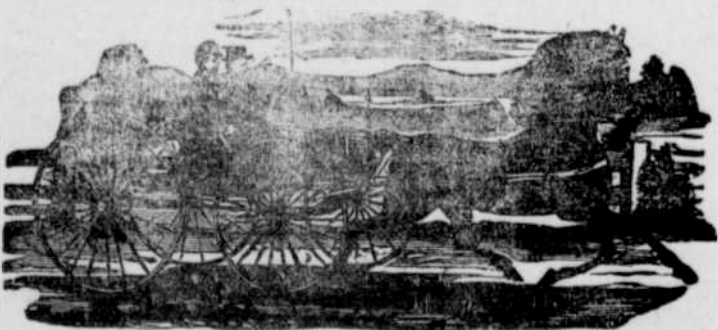
