Express Rates to Be Reduced.

Notice has been received by the local agent of Wells Fargo & Co. express here that arrangements have been completed by the different traffic heads of the express companies operating in the states, whereby the practice of making two separate graduates on exclusive office business will be eliminated in the near future, and instead one graduate under the combined locals will be applicable. All details have not as yet been arranged, but it is expected that definite instructions will be issued some time in March.

The above plan will make quite a reduction in express charges where two or more companies handle the shipment, where it weighs over 7 pounds, but does not apply to packages weighing 7 pounds or less, as the combined rates have been in use heretofore, for instance.

On a ten pound shipment where the separate charges would amount to \$2.40 the combined rate would make a charge of \$1.50. These changes do not apply however where but one express company handle the shipment.

Grandpa Wheeler Dead.

Samuel F. Wheeler, one of the best known and most universally respected citizens of this community, passed peacefully away at his home west of Cottage Grove Wednesday evening, aged 85 years.

Deceased was born at Charleston, Vt., on Dec. 26, 1825. His death took place at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. D. Owens six miles west of Cottage Grove. On May 15, 1847, he was married at Boston to Miss Alice Catherine Ewalley, and they shortly after moved to Minnesota and reared a family of nine, six boys and three girls, all but three of whom have survived their father. Nearly all the living ones are residing in the almost immediate vicinity. The daughters, Mrs. A. D. Owens and Mrs. I. H. Veatch, were both present at the time of their father's death, as were also his son, E. A. Wheeler and his family, besides many other relatives and friends.

"Grandpa" Wheeler, as he was called, came to this state twenty four years ago, and since that time until his death had been identified with everything that has made for the progress of the community. He, together with his sons and daughters, made possible and stood back of in every possible way the "Royal Academy," with its possibilities for an all-round Christian education. He was for thirty six years a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church. Few men at the advanced age reached by Mr. Wheeler have had the clearness of mind and the strength of memory that he had, and when he knew that the change was coming he called for each of his children and his grandchildren, and even when the death dew was gathering, as did Jacob of old, he blessed them and exhorted them to make the most of themselves and their opportunities. Out of deference to the one who had by his own influence and that of his family done so much for it, the Academy was closed Thursday and Friday and the funeral discourse was given by Elder F. S. Bunch from Eccl. 11:3, at the Academy chapel to a large gathering of friends and relatives.

Besides his aged wife, who has been an invalid for over a year, he leaves to mourn his loss eight children, thirty-one grandchildren and six great grand-children. X

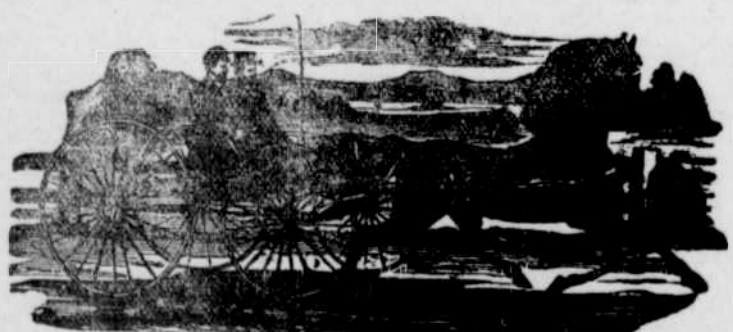
