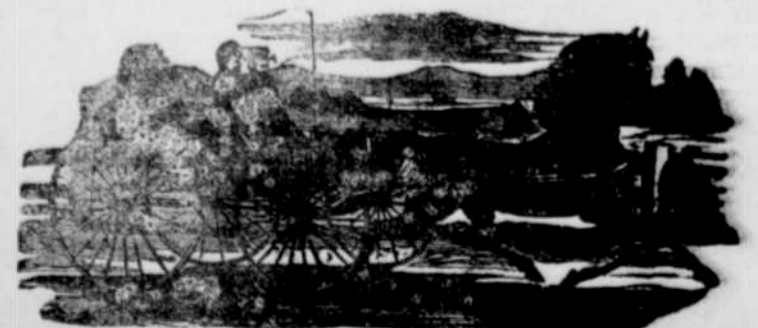

**WAS DEDICATED SUNDAY**

duet entitled, "I'm a Pilgrim,"  
 which added greatly to the effect-  
 iveness of the services. The piano  
 used for the day was very kindly  
 furnished by Mr. Marion Veatch  
 without any expense to the church.  
 A chorus and orchestra led in the  
 evening service of song with Mrs.  
 Walker presiding at the organ.  
 Mr. Parker preached an inspiring,  
 evangelistic sermon. One mem-  
 ber was received at the close of the  
 service. Quite a large number of  
 people are expressing their purpose  
 to unite with the church, enough  
 to nearly double its present mem-  
 bership. As a fitting close to the  
 services of the day, the whole con-  
 gregation rose while the general  
 missionary led in a tender, earnest  
 prayer of consecration and offered  
 to the Lord the building which the  
 little band of local Baptists have  
 labored so faithfully to construct.

**NOTES**

Mr. Foskett spoke of the large  
 amount of assistance rendered by  
 local lumber companies and by  
 men who have freely given their  
 services and labor in a great vari-  
 ety of ways during the construction  
 of the building.

Special mention was made of  
 the zeal and faithfulness of Rev.

 folding chair, a maple, 5-ply  
 veneer chair with shaped back and  
 seat and almost noiseless in action.  
 The church is greatly pleased with  
 them.

Regret was expressed that the  
 former pastor, Rev. E. G. O. Groat  
 could not be present and accept the  
 invitation of the church to preach  
 at its dedication service.

Meetings will be held at the  
 church each evening this week.  
 Mr. Foskett will preach. The  
 public is cordially invited.

**DETAILS OF THAT**  
**BIG TIMBER DEAL**

The Register says:—From Wil-  
 liam Porter, who recently returned  
 from a two months trip to the mid-  
 dle west, we get the details of that  
 \$700,000 timber deal in which he  
 was interested with John F. Wood-  
 ward, formerly of Cottage Grove,  
 but now of Portland.

The deal consisted of the sale of  
 6500 acres of good timber land, the  
 most of it in Coos county, but  
 some little portion in Douglas.  
 The actual consideration for the  
 entire tract was about \$700,000,  
 and the purchasers were F. G.  
 Sanborn and others of Michigan.  
 Mr. Porter and the Haynes Co., of  
 Port Huron, Michigan, owned or  
 controlled enough of the pool to  
 bring in \$500,000 of the purchase  
 money and Mr. Porter says he will  
 now take things easier.

A. L. Woodard last week sold  
 440 acres of timber land in section  
 36, township 21 S, range 4 W., to  
 C. C. Shay of Portland, the con-  
 sideration being \$16,000. This  
 deal was consummated through  
 John F. Woodard, and is the sec-  
 ond large timber transaction  
 brought about by him within the  
 last few months.

**Legislative Notes.**

A bill in the senate prohibits the  
 killing of China pheasants for five  
 years.

Senator M. A. Miller's bill to  
 create a State Printing Board has  
 been indefinitely postponed.

The bill to appropriate \$100,000  
 for the Astoria Centennial went to  
 the scrap heap this week.

The senate has passed the bill  
 creating the office of assis-  
 tant secretary of state and declaring an  
 emergency.

Unless there is a general and  
 universal change of opinion before  
 the end of the session, capital  
 punishment will not be abolished  
 by the 26th legislature.

The governor has signed two  
 bills, one providing for the regis-  
 tration of the names of farms and  
 the other allowing Clatsop county  
 to make a special levy for the As-  
 toria Centennial.
