The Portland Daily Journal says: "The Cottage Grove Leader suggests use of the referendum on the University of Oregon appropriation. Eugene fought hard against Nesmith county." Unless the Leader is greatly mistaken the people of Oregon will invoke the referendum on several of the appropriations made by the legislature.

Former Governor William Paine Lord, of Oregon, died at Hahnemann hospital, San Francisco, Friday, after a week's illness. Heart trouble was the cause of death. He was 72 years of age and a native of Delaware. The body will be taken to Salem for interment. Lord was a member of the Oregon supreme court from 1878 to 1892 and was elected governor in 1895. In 1899 he was appointed minister to Argentina, since his return he has been code commissioner of Oregon.

All this talk about invoking the seal on Assessor B. F. Keeney for carrying out the letter of the law in fulfilling the duties of his offices as tax collector of Lane county, is the rankest nonsense.
