Busch Wins Wrestling Bout.

In the fastest and most exciting wrestling match ever pulled off in Roseburg, Carl Busch, alleged champion wrestler of Oregon, threw L. W. Dyreborg, wrestling instructor of the Sacramento Athletic club, two straight falls here Wednesday. Busch was awarded the first fall in one hour and five minutes, and the second fall in 25 minutes. The exhibition was attended by several hundred people, and intense interest was manifested throughout the match.—Roseburg News.

Eggleston Bill Killed.

Senator Wood's bill, providing a method for creating new counties, passed the House, which indefinitely postponed a bill by Eggleston on the same subject.

The Eggleston bill was objected to because it was virtually a copy of the initiative bill rejected by the people in the November election. It left the question of creating new counties entirely to the voters in the territory of which the proposed county was to consist. The Wood bill requires a vote of 35 per cent of the residents of the county from which territory is taken and 65 per cent of the vote in the territory of the proposed new county before the new county asked for can be established legally. This will make it almost impossible to create a new county.

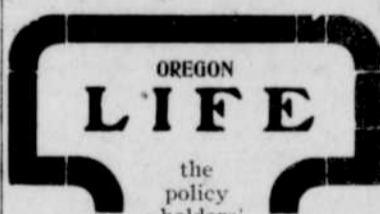
