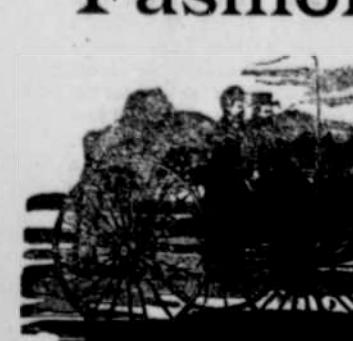

J. E. YARNELL PASSES TO THE GREAT BEYOND

James Elmer Yarnell, a native
son of Oregon and a well known
resident of Eugene, died at the
Eugene hospital Wednesday, Feb.
15, of meningitis as a result of la
grippe. He was taken sick on
Monday at the Smeede hotel where
he was stopping and his physician
then told him he had some compli-
cation with the attack of lagrippe
with which he suffered severely
and advised him to go to the hos-
pital.

He leaves a wife, who has been
at Salem for a number of years,
and two sons: Wayne, who is at
Iditarod, Alaska, and another who
is at Boise with relatives attending
school. His daughter, Edna, was
drowned at the head of the mill
race a year or two ago. He also
has several brothers and sisters.

James E. Yarnell was born in
Kirbyville, Josephine county, Ore-
gon, in 1862, and with his parents
came to Lane county when about
three years of age. He received
his early education in the district
schools at Mohawk, Cottage Grove
and Boise, Idaho; and in 1885
married Miss Luella McGee, whose
home was on the Mohawk.

He was a member of the Odd
Fellows lodge in this city and they
will probably have charge of the
funeral services, though the time
has not yet been set, pending the
arrival of relatives.

Mr. Yarnell has been engaged
in buying and selling real estate in
and about Eugene for several years
and built the sorority house for the
Klosche Tillacum sorority on Alder
street, which he named "Edna
Hall" in memory of his deceased
daughter which he recently traded
for a farm on the River road which
he sold recently.—Guard.

ADDITIONAL LOCAL

This is the dullest season of the
year for the lumber market and
there is not much doing. When
spring opens up it is hoped the
market will improve and the mills
be started in full capacity.

A Polk county man started with

week while suffering from the grip

knowing which of the brands
effected a cure, he will have to
take the whole course over again
the next time he gets the grip.

The Leader believes it would be
a wise plan to fumigate the city
school rooms occasionally, espe-
cially the rooms of the lower grades
since there has been so much sick-
ness common to childhood this
winter—chickenpox, measles,
whooping cough and the grip. If
these lower grade rooms were fum-
igated every Friday evening they
would be clean and free of con-
tagion by Monday. The health
officer has visited the schools re-
peatedly, but has only been par-
tially successful in impressing
upon the schools the necessity of
these sanitary measures. His
recommendations should be carried
out to the letter.

to perform a statesman-like service
for the consuming masses of the
country.
