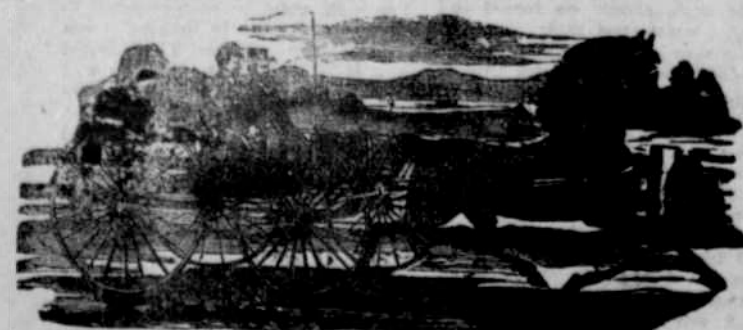

### JOHN J. TUNELL DIES AT AGE OF NINETY.

John J. Tunell, a resident of Oregon since 1873, and who had resided in Creswell since 1877, died at the home of his son, John Tunell Friday, March 10, after an illness covering several weeks.

Mr. Tunell was born in Germany on January 7, 1821, and was 90 years, two months and three days old at the time of his death. He was married in 1845 to Mary Balky and came to the United States in 1848. He resided in Illinois, Michigan, Iowa and Minnesota prior to taking up his residence in Oregon. Besides the son, above mentioned, Mr. Tunell leaves one daughter, Mrs. Geo. L. Gilfry who resides in Creswell two grandsons, James Lane and John Lindsey, and three great-grand children, all of whom reside near Creswell. He was a member of the German Lutheran church and was a man highly respected by his many friends.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. G. Grozier at Methodist church Saturday afternoon, interment taking place at the Howe cemetery.—Creswell Chronicle.

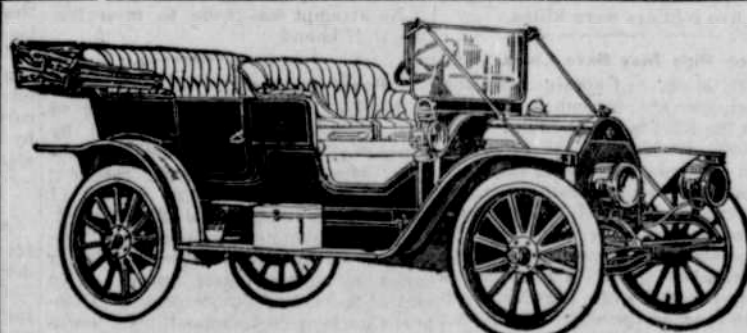
