THE COAST RANGE LUMBER COMPANY

(Eugene Register.)

H. C. Mahon of the Coast Range Lumber company, after many obstacles and much hard work, has succeeded in organizing his lumber company which promises to become one of the principal factors in the lumbering interests of Lane county, if not in the entire state. The new company takes over the timber, mill and other property of the old Sunset Lumber company and has since bought large amounts of timber land adjoining the old properties so now their holdings will aggregate 5000 acres principally in the Mohawk valley and running across the Calapooia range into Linn county. The timber is all gilt edge and it will keep them busy for many years transforming it into the finished and marketable product. The mill will be rebuilt putting in engines and boilers for 1000 horsepower and the mill will be established to a working capacity of 100,000 feet for a 10-hour day.

PERSONNEL OF COMPANY.

The company has been fully organized on a firm financial basis, the capitalization is ample and the money is here now for the work which is to be done. The nine directors of the company are H. C. Mahon of Eugene, G. K. Wentworth of Chicago, W. H. Voris of Chicago, J. O. Elrod, R. V. Jones, G. K. Wentworth, Jr., and L. J. Wentworth, all of Portland, H. Koepke of Athena, Oregon, and R. H. Kipp of Spokane. The officers chosen from these directors are G. K. Wentworth, president; R. H. Kipp, vice president; J. O. Elrod, treasurer, and H. C. Mahon secretary and manager. J. A. Link, of the Portland Lumber company, has been secured as superintendent of the work of construction and also of the work of the mill.

One thing can be said for the retiring mayor, Dr. Kime and his associate aldermen and that is they made a reality of two great important and needed improvements that former councils had talked of for years—the paving of Main street and a water works system with cold, pure and wholesome Lang creek as its source. These will be lasting monuments to the progressive and enterprising municipal administration of Dr. Kime and his aldermen. It was an administration which "delivered the goods."

Judging from Monday's election Cottage Grove has a "dry" vote of from 55 to 75 majority.

P. I. Rust, of Eugene, who is interested in establishing a fruit dryer at Cottage Grove, was in town last week promoting the proposition, and with President F. D. Wheeler, of the Commercial club, viewed several prospective sites. Mr. Rust asks the citizens to provide the site, whereupon he will erect a building 40x85 feet, together with a large warehouse. The plant will, if negotiations are consummated, have greater capacity than the dryer destroyed by fire last fall, Mr. Rust believing in providing for the future. He is desirous of concluding arrangements forthwith that work on the building may be commenced in this month.

A Dry Month.

From E. G. Briggs, the Eugene weather observer, we learn that the total precipitation for the month of March was 1.07 inches against 1.92 inches for March, 1910, which was also considered a dry March. The precipitation for February, 1911, was 2.88 inches against 5.66 inches for the same month in 1910. Our precipitation since January 1 is far below the normal and we will have to get a great deal of rain in April and May to bring it up anywhere near the average rainfall, and give crops a chance to mature. A greater acreage of crops has been sown this year than for any previous year in the history of the country and if we get seasonable rains we will get a big crop.
