Last week's sensational charges of bribery or attempted bribery and bartering in University referendum petitions published in the Daily Oregonian involving the University of Oregon faculty, the Cottage Grove committee and others did not have a tendency to elevate that state educational institution in the minds of the reading public, nor favorably impress any one with this referendum movement and the alleged motives back of it. As far as the Cottage Grove committee is concerned, the Leader believes it has worked along legitimate lines with an honest and conscientious purpose and for the welfare of the community and interests represented. But owing to existing circumstances and the attitude of Cottage Grove toward the University city a generally satisfactory movement on the part of those most interested seems almost impossible. However, there should be no trifling with the referendum, nor the petitions upon which the people have appended their names in good faith, being sincere in the belief that their wishes thus expressed would be faithfully and honestly carried out.

While the whole affair is like unto a tempest in a teapot, it is regrettable and unfortunate for all concerned as well as the issues involved.

SOME WOMEN AND MEN

The women of Lakeview several years ago organized a public library, secured their own land, put a fine building on it themselves and now have 1200 volumes in the library, are out of debt and have money in the treasury. That's gumption. About two year ago the men of the same place organized a board of trade, with \$1600 capital. Now it is bankrupt and the board is dead.

Credit for the origination of Mother's Day is due to Miss Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia, who conceived the idea in a desire to commemorate the anniversary of her mother's death. It occurred to her that it would be a beautiful tribute to all mothers, whether living or departed, if their children, on a given day, would unite in wearing a flower. Although it had its beginning not much more than three years ago, the sentiment appealed so strongly to the people that it has spread from ocean to ocean, and is now practically an established institution. It has been fostered by the churches and by the various organizations originating therein, and besides has been taken up by secret orders as entitled to universal extension and perpetuation.
