WOMEN ARE ARRAIGNED.

Mrs. John A. Logan Holds Them Responsible For Family Failures.

The much discussed and abused American woman has been the recipient of another scathing arraignment, and this time from Mrs. John A. Logan, wife of the noted soldier and politician. Mrs. Logan did not criticize by innuendo, for her thrusts were direct and her charges sweeping.

Not only are the women of today neglecting the opportunities that once made them responsible for many American achievements, in Mrs. Logan's opinion, but "they are becoming careless, mentally supine and morally slipshod." They are also becoming tipplers and gamblers, the critic asserts, and American boarding schools do not



now "teach girls how to become good wives and mothers, and their own mothers do not teach them the great lessons of responsibility."

In the matter of feminine extravagance Mrs. Logan is even more vehement and holds women responsible for half the business failures.

"They drag their men to ruin," says she, "by their sinful waste, the mad rapacity of their demands for more. They must have gowns and costly furniture, no matter whether their husbands have sufficient money or if there is a millstone of debt tied to the man's neck."

So far as fashion's dictates are concerned, Mrs. Logan holds that women are the befooled victims of commerce. "The changing styles are not to be charged up to woman's love of beauty, but to her willingness to be led docile and sheeplike by commercialists who prey upon her," she asserts.

Paris to Restore Artistic Eighteenth Century Pastboard.

The enthusiastic collectors of picture postcards may soon have a new fad demanding their attention, for the announcement comes from Paris that the ornamental calling card of the eighteenth and early part of the nineteenth centuries is to reappear.

It was France that started the ornamental fad which, viewed in these



days of small, plain cards of script, gothic and old English engraving, appears marvelous. In the heyday of the decorated pastboards, remember, there was nothing cheap about them. Renowned artists, designers and engravers did not hesitate to produce some of the finest specimens of their art. The custom spread rapidly to Germany, Italy and England and lasted until after the French revolution.

The popular designs embraced cupids holding scrolls bearing the names of some noble lady, mythological personages pointing to the caller's name, elaborate backgrounds of cities, ancient ruins and harbors and sometimes views of favorite lounging rooms with the caller shown seated
