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BAD ACCIDENT AT DISSTON

Pioneer Drops Dead at Willamina --- Train Holdup at Drain

Jos. Perkins, Jr. had his left foot and leg, below the knee, crushed and broken in the logging camp at the Disston mill Friday evening by getting caught between two logs. The fractures were reduced by a local physician and the young man was sent to a Portland hospital to be cared for until he is able to get about again.

Pioneer Drops Dead.

Thomas Brown, an Indian war veteran and esteemed pioneer, dropped dead from heart disease Sunday while walking about in his dooryard at Willamina, Oregon. Deceased was the father of Mrs. J. S. Silsby of this city and Mrs. Silsby and little daughter were guests of her parents at the time of her father's death. Mr. Brown was aged about 70 years.

Train Robbers Get Busy.

Two highwaymen entered the mail car of the south bound overland at Drain last Friday night held up the mail clerks, looted the registered mail and forced the clerks to stop the train near Yoncalla and allow them to escape. Blood hounds were sent to the scene from Salem and a posse headed by Sheriff Quine of Roseburg was early on the scene, but no trace of them has been found.

DRAIN STORE BURGLARIZED.

A merchandise store was burglarized at Drain the same night by two men. They boldly purchased tickets for Junction the same night where they remained until Sunday when they went to Albany and were arrested upon suspicion and the stolen goods found in their suit case. They will "do time" at Salem.

Denny Cummins Fined \$500.

Denny Cummins, proprietor of the Hotel Springfield, paid a fine of \$500 in the circuit court last week for violating the local option law. A few days ago the grand jury returned an indictment against him and his arrest followed. He appeared in court and waived time for sentence. Judge Harris imposed the fine and warned him not to repeat the offense or he would probably have to serve a jail term. It was alleged in the indictment that Cummins sold liquor to Cecil Rhodes on April 29, 1911.

PREDICTS REVIVAL IN LUMBER MARKET

Seattle, June 15.—A. J. Earling, president of the Milwaukee railway arrived here today in company with a party of eastern business men. Earling made a close inspection of crop conditions along the Milwaukee and predicts unusually large crop in the Dakotas, Iowa and Minnesota. As a consequence there will be a heavy demand for lumber and other forest products of the Pacific Northwest. Within 60 to 90 days lumbermen will have more orders for rail shipment than at any time since 1909, and the general effect cannot be other than good on all lines of business.

CIRCUIT COURT CASES OF INTEREST

James Law, aged 70 years, who was brought down from Blakeleyville and pleaded guilty to selling booze contrary to law was fined \$50 which was paid. His was not an aggravated case and being so old the court was a little lenient with him.

Having changed his plea of not guilty to that of guilty after the jury had been selected to try him on the charge of selling liquor in violation of the local option law, Walter E. King, was sentenced by Judge Harris to serve 25 days in the county jail.

Mrs. Ida R. Bingham has instituted suit in the circuit court against her husband, Benjamin S. Bingham, for divorce, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Eugene, June 10, 1908, and have one child, Belden, I., who was born on April 28, 1909. Mrs. Bingham asks that she be allowed \$15 a month for the support of the child. I. N. Harbaugh is her attorney in the case.—Guard.

The jury in the case of W. J. Scharen vs. Stuber et al. brought in a verdict of damages for one cent for the plaintiff. Defendant's attorney says this will not throw the costs on defendant, as many suppose, for in such dowage cases a verdict must be returned for at least \$50 for the plaintiff or the costs fall on him. Defendant Stuber went to the county clerk and paid his one cent damages and took a receipt for the same and says he will keep it as a souvenir.

In the personal injury case of Herman Breese vs The Wildwood Lumber company, the jury brought in a verdict for plaintiff for \$1200 damages much to the surprise of the attorney for the defendant company.

REV. BURBANK ONE YEAR IN JAIL.

Rev. George Burbank, of Co. burg, who pleaded guilty to the charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor female, received a sentence of one year in the county jail. He asked no leniency for himself, but wanted the judge to make the fine as light as possible as his wife had little to live on and the taking away of money or property would work a hardship on her.

SLATER TO CHECK REFERENDUM LISTS

Salem, Ore., June 15.—Judge W. T. Slater will begin immediately checking what he claims to be fraudulent signatures on referendum petitions. Because the law provides that the secretary of state shall not allow the petitions to leave the building, and with the large bulk a special room is necessary. All names will be photographed and typewritten from the original copy of the petitions, after which the investigators will place the photographs in the hands of several men to ascertain their genuineness.

R. H. Harris, of this city, stated today that he has been advised that W. T. Parkison will make no attempts to arrest any of the men who he has evidence fraudulently secured names on the petitions until after the investigation now being made by Judge Slater and others has been completed. Harris says Parkison now holds a confession from one of the men he employed to circulate petitions to the effect that fictitious names were secured. To secure this confession, Harris claims, Parkison called one of his men into his office and told him that, unless he made a confession, he (Parkison) would have him taken from the office to jail, and in this manner secured a full confession from the man threatened and sufficient information to convict others of fraud.
