Sims Arouses Kaiser's Ire, A la Coghlan



CLAIMANT for the international disturbance honors worn by the late Rear Admiral Coghlan of "Loch der Kaiser" fame has appeared in the United States navy in the person of Commander William S. Sims, supreme officer of the battleship Minnesota, flagship of the third division of the Atlantic fleet, now in European waters.

Commander Sims' prominence is due to a "last drop of blood" speech, a sort of elaborated hands across the sea effort, made in the Guildhall, London, following a dinner and reception to the rank and file of the American fleet by the lord mayor and sheriffs of London. It has proved a hornets' nest, for Germany is again affronted and has asked an explanation, and so has the secretary of the navy. Other nations in addition to Germany, it is said, have objected to a commander of the United States navy practically promising American support to England in the event of war.

What did Commander Sims say that has so upset the tranquillity of foreign

powers? Well, according to three London papers this was his speech in commenting on the reception accorded the American sailors:

"It is my belief that if the time ever comes when the English empire is seriously menaced by an external enemy its people may count upon every man, every dollar, every ship and every drop of blood in their kindred across the sea."

This sentiment aroused the greatest enthusiasm ever heard in the historic Guildhall, according to the London reporters, and it continued when Chief Bontswain Carl Benson of the Minnesota followed his chief with a few remarks tending to accentuate the commander's position. He concluded:

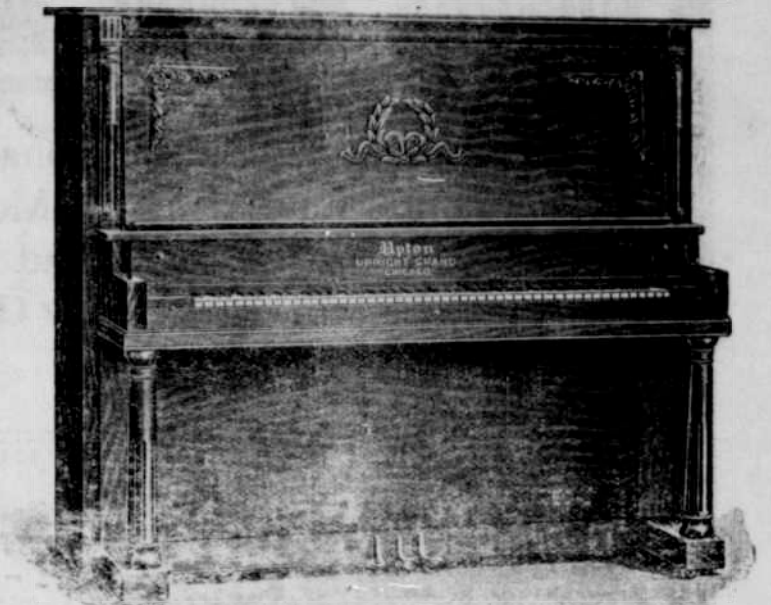
"May these two navies always stand together, both in peace and in war."

Commander Sims is the naval officer who was appointed to his present post by Theodore Roosevelt before retiring from the presidency after service as Inspector of target practice. He was the youngest man ever entrusted with so important a command, and the president at that time stated officially that he regarded Sims as having in seven years' time built up the American navy to five times its former strength by the proficiency in gunnery which he brought about and new designing of big gun battleships.
