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WILL REBUILD LUMBER PLANT

Big Real Estate Transfer Involving \$40,000 Portland Fire

J. H. Chambers, whose sawmill was destroyed by fire a fortnight ago, is having plans for a new structure to replace the old one prepared and will probably commence rebuilding during the ensuing week. The mill will be of considerably larger capacity than the plant destroyed. Mr. Chambers has large timber holdings directly tributary to the mill, and the two camps which were at work at the time of the fire have not ceased work. These logs have been placed in the river awaiting completion of the proposed new mill.

J. I. Jones Sells His Ranch.

J. I. Jones on Monday sold through Walker & Fisher of Eugene his 710-acre ranch north of this city, the consideration at \$50 per acre being about \$40,000. The purchasers are Col. Young and Bird Rose. This farm consists of about 400 acres of river bottom land, most of which is in cultivation and 310 acres of hill land, of which about 100 acres is in cultivation. There are splendid improvements on the place, consisting of two good houses and a stock barn 50 by 136 feet. Last year there was raised on the place 98 bushels of oats to the acre and 40 bushels of wheat to the acre. The purchasers get possession of the property on October 1, and Mr. Jones retains the crop for this year. The tenants of Mr. Jones, the Easley Bros., who have the place leased for a number of years will surrender their lease Oct. 1, for a stated sum agreed upon.

Back to Missouri.

The Easley Brothers, Ralph and Frank, who have had the J. I. Jones 700-acre farm leased for a number of years, will give up their lease Oct. 1, when this farm will be turned over to the new owners and the Easley Bros., will sell off their surplus stock, grain, hay and implements and return to their former home at LaPlata, Missouri. They will take with them several of their best Belgian colts, their span of thoroughbred Belgian mares and the fine Belgian stallion, "Wallenberg," which they recently purchased from their uncle, J. I. Jones, and they will engage in raising fine horses back in their Missouri home. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Easley of LaPlata, are now guests at the farm.

Portland's Fire Chief Killed.

Portland, June 26.—Fire Chief Dave Campbell was killed and Assistant Chief John Young was injured by the explosion of 1200 barrels of oil in the plant of the Union Oil Co., here this morning. The plant was totally destroyed and was valued at \$100,000. Charles Sylvester who was near the Chief believes Fireman H. Christoferson also perished in the building and two other men lost their lives there. Outbound trains were all delayed by damaged tracks.

BOHEMIA MINES ARE ATTRACTING CAPITAL

A company of St. Louis capitalists with their wives arrived in Cottage Grove Saturday, registered at Hotel Oregon, and proceeded forthwith on an inspection of certain mining properties in the Bohemia district. Part of the company returned to this city Sunday evening, the others remaining in the camp until Monday evening, and they all expressed themselves as being decidedly pleased with the prospects in the Bohemia mining camp and most favorably impressed with the Clark property in particular, for which, we understand, negotiations for its purchase are pending, involving a large sum of money. Just what the report of these people will be to others interested remains to be seen, but there is little doubt but what they will invest in Bohemia. This visiting or inspecting party comprised, George Busch and wife, Fred Busch and wife, Capt. W. E. Nash and wife and their secretary and guide. The Busch's are said to be nephews of the multi-millionaire brewer of Milwaukee of the same name.

It is announced that the sale of Clark mine involving something like \$200,000 has been practically consummated.

Geo. Thow and John Bingham, two California miners, went to the Champion mine last week.

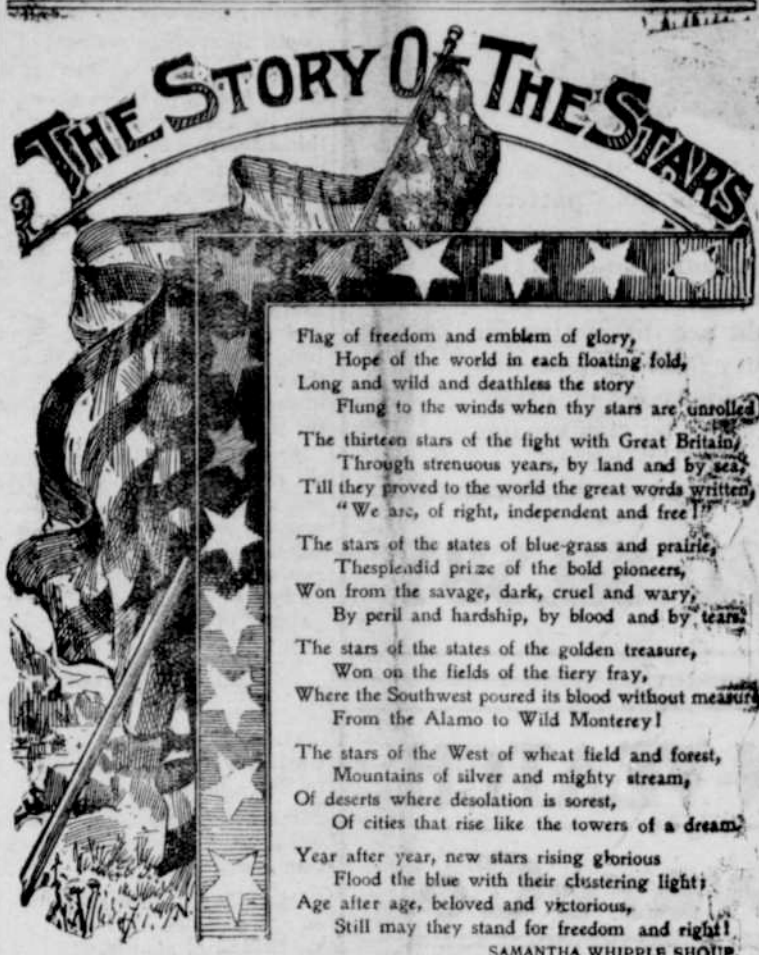
F. P. Talkington of Salem, is in town today in the interest of the Golden Slipper mining property in Bohemia.

NEGOTIATIONS FOR BLACK BUTTE MINE

It is reported that negotiations are pending for the purchase of the Cimbar mines at Black Butte, and that the deal will probably be closed within a short time. St. Louis, Missouri, capitalists are parties to the proposed transaction, and if the negotiations are successful the mine will be operated on a large scale.

Ground Broken for New Building.

Ground was broken last week for the new \$86,000 horticulture building at the Oregon Agricultural college, which it is hoped will be ready for occupancy January 1, next. The new structure, which will form south wing to the main agricultural hall, similar to the agronomy building on the north, is of classic architecture, 131x73 feet, with three stories and a commodious basement which alone will contain finer facilities for horticultural instruction than are to be found anywhere else in the west. The construction, like the sister buildings, is of red brick trimmed with white sandstone, with Doric columns at the two entrances, east and south.
