

ADVENTISTS WILL HOLD BIG TENT MEETINGS

Eugene, June 24.—The Seventh Day Adventists began a series of evangelistic meetings in a big tent that has been erected at the corner of West Eleventh and Lincoln streets for that purpose, June 23. A large evangelistic company representing the different lines of their work are conducting the meetings. A brief was published in 1848. Today they have 110 local conferences and 25 union conferences. The membership is now over 100,000 and the number of ministers and other workers, 6570.

Number of churches, 2,567; number of schools, academies, etc., 291; number of teachers, 669; number of students, 30,000; number of sanitariums, treatment rooms, etc., 229; number of doctors and other helpers, 1,105; number of publishing houses, 43; publications in 61 leading languages of the world.

The Adventists are a self-supporting people, and last year \$2,500,000 was given for the support of the world work.

ANNUAL REPORT OF UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

Board of regents of the University of Oregon met in regular session Tuesday augmented by Governor West, Secretary Alderman and Superintendent Alderman as members.

President Campbell presented his report, in which he recommended graduation of 131 students in all departments.

The total enrollment for the year in all departments has been 1482 and distributed in the departments as follows: Graduate school, 9; college of literature, science and the arts, 514; college of engineering, 138; summer school, 80; the school of law, 185; school of medicine, 74; school of music, 209; correspondence school, 378. This totals 1587, but deducting names appearing twice leaves 1482.

His report states that the upholding of the legislative appropriations by the referendum will greatly burden the work of the University and he is obliged to limit his recommendations to the old appropriation, involving an increase of the budget for 1911 of \$245, but of a saving in salaries for this year of \$650, and an increase in the budget of 1912 of \$900, but of a saving in the salaries of this year of \$1000.

Because of falling short of the available resources this year by \$2881.78, it is proposed to reduce the standing \$10,000 appropriation for the purchase of books by \$5000 which will offset the above loss, rather than take it out of the instructors' salaries, and leave a slight margin for small additions to the budget. The report emphasizes that this must be positively temporary. It is believed that the provision of adequate teaching force is a matter of first consequence and should take precedence over either the purchase of books or apparatus.

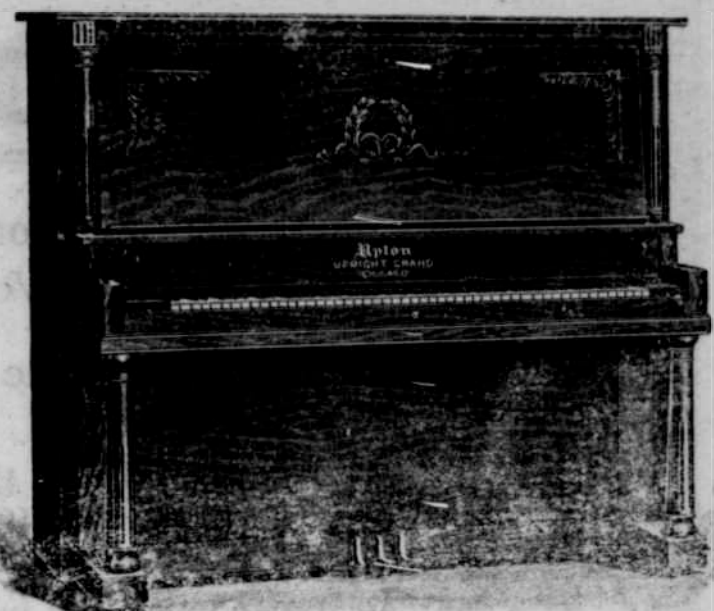
