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GIRLS GROWING LESS MODEST.

The rather amazing assertion is made by a New York teacher of stage dancing that not only are more and more girls with comfortable incomes seeking opportunities to exhibit their charms in public, but that their lack of modesty in displaying their physical perfections puts seasoned professionals of their own sex to the blush.

"Most of them are members of well-to-do families," the dancing mistress said, "and a great number are society ladies with very aristocratic handles to their names. A Pleasant Hill party was circulating a recall petition in Cottage Grove Saturday, involving the assessor and Lane county court, but he did not do a rushing business in this community, where most of the people are from Missouri and have to be shown; in the first place, that these county officials are really deserving of such radical action by any of their official acts, and secondly, if they were recalled that a better set of men could or would be elected to fill their respective places. The recall by its intimidating tendencies is going to bring about a worse condition than it was created to remedy.

The city engineer and councilmen believe the water pipe line from Lang Creek will never carry a full head of water unless it is increased in size at the intake and for some distance therefrom to 20 or 24 inches which will incur an expense of from \$800 to \$1000. At the present time the pipe line is 12 inches in diameter the entire distance and it is estimated only carries about one-third head of water, which keeps the reservoir only about one-half filled. This is a result predicted by George Lea and other water works contractors at the very outset of the work. However, with plenty of water in the west side reservoir there is no danger of a shortage this year or during the proposed enlargement of the pipe for some distance from the intake.

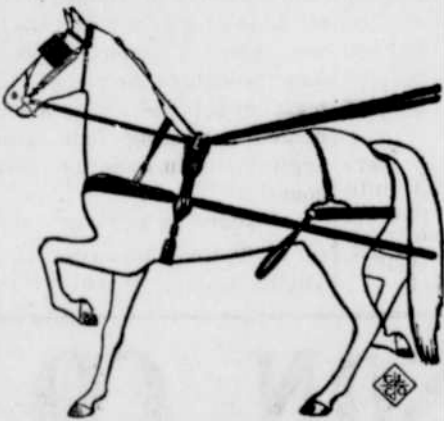

More Street Improvements.

City council held a comparatively short session last week, transacting routine business for the month.

The bid of A. J. Willard for the improvement of Cherry street at \$900, without the drainage tile was accepted. The council postponed action on the proposed improvement of West Second street.

The city treasurer was directed to transfer from the sewer fund to the Tennessee avenue improvement fund the necessary amount of money needed by the latter fund. The city engineer was directed to prepare the assessments for Tennessee avenue.

Councilman Martin was authorized to erect a standpipe for the street sprinkler.

Permission was granted W. W. Hawley to tap the Lang Creek pipe line, and use the water for a period of three years.
