One third of the beds of the hospital are to be free to poor people. The disciples have raised \$150,000 toward this project, which amount has been promptly matched by Mr. Long, plus \$50,000. Before coming to Portland Mr. Long closed a deal for thirty three acres of land, over-looking Kansas City. It is the intention of those who have the matter in charge to found the hospital, or more properly, hospitals on this tract of land. Aside from the gift just mentioned Mr. Long has invested about \$500,000 in the various national and international enterprises of the Christian church.
