PUSHING REFERENDUM

Salem, Ore., July 21 .- Although advices received here indicate that H. J. Parkison is in Chicago, instead of in California, where he said he intended to visit his mother ex-Justice W. T. Slater said today that there will be no attempt to bring him back here in connection with the suit to save the appropriation for the University of Oregon from the operation of the referendum.

SAW MILLS GET **OLD FREIGHT RATE**

Washington, July 18 .- The interstate commerce commission today, in the case of the Oregon & Washington Lumber Manufacturers' association against the Southern Pacific and other Pacific coast carriers, held that the existing rate of \$5 on a ton of rough green fir from points in the Willamette valley to San Francisco and points taking the same rate were unreasonable.

The carriers are ordered to put the rate at \$3.50 a ton, excepting on the Wendling branch, from points on which a rate of \$3.75 is ordered. The rates prescribed do not apply to mills located within the city of Portland, Oregon, which take a uniform rate of \$5 per ton on all kinds of lumber.

Edward Ostrander, secretary of the Oregon & Washington Lumber Manufacturers' association, in commenting on the decision and the effect it would have upon lumber shipments from this city and the Willamette valley said:

"This is the case that was heard before Commissioner Prouty in February of this year at the time that the case of the Southern Portland mills was heard and which was also decided favorably to the mills a few days ago.


