**NEWSY LETTER
 FROM CHINA**

especially, for we know that China is changing very much as a nation. When I got back I was talking to a Chinese teacher about the country and he said, "It's awful! sometimes they have the cows right beside their bed-room." I laughed and said, "In our country we think a cow is cleaner than a pig and nearly every Chinese home has a pig or pigs that go all over the house, even up-stairs and in the bed rooms." 'Tis true, the "pig in the parlor," is a reality, even in homes of the best people, and not only in the parlor, but I've eaten many a Chinese meal with a pig, a dog and several chickens, under and around the table. The average housewife here never scrubs nor dusts, though of course at times she sweeps. 'Tis so easy to keep house. The bed is made by folding up lengthwise, the one heavy comfort and putting it at the back of the bed. The meal is ready when the rice is done and three or four bowls of dried fish, vegetable soup, or pickles are put on the table. The dishes are washed when the chop sticks have been rolled together in hot water and the bowls that each one uses for rice, have been washed—not dried. The housewife must make pickles and dry vegetables for winter, and in the country she makes hemp cloth for clothes. Then there are the family shoes to make and in most homes are a lot of unkept children; the most visible signs of care that we can see are that the little girls feet are bound and the fantastic way that both boys and girls have their heads shaved from infancy up to about six years. How the people live in such dirt and sleep at night, several in one tiny bedroom with positively no opening for air or light, I honestly don't know how they do it and live, but surely China is a prolific nation, and the streets swarm with babies. I had a baby girl offered me by the father last week, not only offered, but urged upon me. He said they had too many.

I visited ten villages while out and examined as many day schools for girls with an average of about seventeen to a school. It pays though and the most promising come in here to school.

I must stop now though there is much more I could tell.
