Smelter for Portland.

Portland Journal: With the development of several new mining districts in the Pacific northwest and from which ore has to be shipped by way of Portland to the smelter at Tacoma, is bound to follow the establishment of a smelter in this city, it is said. It is pointed out that in addition to being a valuable asset to industrial Portland, it would mean a big saving to shippers of ore.

Practically all of the ore mined in Idaho is shipped to Tacoma by way of Portland and if this ore could be reduced here it would mean a saving of about \$3 per ton, it is pointed out. The quantity of ore now being shipped is said to be insignificant compared to the movement that will follow the opening up of the central part of Idaho, where Hill and Harriman engineers and surveyors are now busy.
