Development League Announces Meetings.

An outline of the work which
the Northwestern Development
League expects to do is given out
from the office of the secretary.
The executive committee, com-
posed of representatives from the
seven northwestern states, has been
called to meet in Spokane Oct. 3,
by President Penwell to approve
plans.

The Land Products Show of the
League has already been announced
to be held in St. Paul December 12
to 23.

Following this show the League
plans to establish permanent ex-
hibits in St. Paul and Chicago,
showing the products and giving
out information about the states in
the League. The officers in con-
nection with the exhibits will send
daily or semi-weekly, names of
those who visit the state exhibits,
to immigration officials of the
states, commercial clubs and rail-
road land departments.

Next June the Northwestern
Development Congress, or annual
meeting of the League will be held
in Seattle. The dates have just
been announced by Rufus Wilson,
the representative of the League in
Seattle, the big meeting occupying
five days from June 6 to June 10.

Several publications are being
prepared for the League by the
secretary's office which will give
uniform information about the
seven states in the League and a
number of maps showing irrigated
districts, dry farming sections, for-
ests, mountains and public lands and
tracts available for settlement.
Large quantities of these booklets
will be distributed and the inquiries
received sent to the states belong-
ing to the League.

Seven states and Alaska have
accepted the space tendered them
at the Northwest Land Show to be
held in St. Paul December 12 to 23
under the auspices of the North-
western Development League.

A week ago word was sent to the
governors of the states advising
that space had been bought by
Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth
business men to be apportioned to
the states in the League. Every
governor has replied that the space
would be accepted and filled with
products.

Among the most interesting ex-
hibits will be that from Alaska,
which will show not only the min-
eral, fur and fish products, but also
demonstrate that Alaska is a good
country for gardening and will
produce more wheat and barley
than Norway and Sweden com-
bined.

Since this state has been given a
large amount of space at the Land
Show to be held in St. Paul Dec.
15 to 23, the management of the
show is now asking the land com-
panies of the state to interest them-
selves and take advantage of the
showing to be made by the state.
When the state as a whole makes
a good showing, the land com-
panies have an opportunity to
make a special exhibit from the
tracts of land in which they are
interested. A small amount of
space is offered for sale to such
companies at reasonable rates.

New Mexico and Arizona Admitted to Statehood.

Washington, Aug. 21.—Vice-
President Sherman and Speaker
Champ Clark today, signed the
joint statehood bill admitting New
Mexico and Arizona, which was
then sent to President Taft for his
signature. He will sign it.

larger proportions than this might
well feel proud.

The new fruit dryer that is being
built on south Fifth street by P. I.
Rust, of Eugene, is nearing com-
pletion and will be in readiness for
the prune crop which will be in
full blast by Oct. 1st. This dryer
when completed will be one of the
best equipped plants in the state
and will be a valuable addition to
our community. The building is
54x80 feet and two stories high;
the furnace room is made of con-
crete and is 10x43 feet; it has three
furnaces and each will operate four
tunnels, making twelve in all.
Each tunnel will hold 144 trays
and each tray weighs 30 pounds
of the ripe fruit.

alow that is under construction on
his property on Wall st., near the
Adventist church, will be one of
the finest residence in this city and
it will be modern through out.

ow on Railroad Ave. is nearing
completion and will add greatly to
the appearance of this already at-
tractive street.
