EX-CANNIBAL VISITS COTTAGE GROVE

David John Henry Allen Zam-
boss Swack Hanner, an ex-can-
nibal from Hayti, but now a lec-
turer, who has traveled over 275,-
000 miles, has been in Cottage
Grove several days and made the
LEADER a genial call on Saturday.
He has long since abandoned all
cannibalistic ideas, and as he in-
troduced himself produced a large
roll of press clippings and a half
hundred credentials from instruc-
tors in public schools, attestings,
to interesting lectures which he had
delivered at the institutions of
learning.

David is giving the lectures for
the purpose of raising funds with
which to enable him to take up a
business course. He is well edu-
cated and his lectures are said to
be quite interesting. He explains
the details of rice, coffee and tea
culture, and discusses phases of
life in Hayti and the Philippines.
He states that there are at least
7500 cannibals in the island of
Hayti at present.

People have read a great deal
concerning cannibalism, but few
have actually met a real cannibal.
David is a cannibal that was, his
ideas today being quite to the con-
trary, it being his desire to help
his people break away from their
barbaric ideas.

But Hayti is not so bad these
days as one might think. "I have
some excerpts from the constitution
of Hayti," said the ex-cannibal,
"and I really believe there are
some features which this country
can profit by."

The excerpts from the constitu-
tion show that in Hayti there are
no pool rooms, billiard halls or
cheap theatres. Boys or girls are
not allowed on the streets after 9
o'clock, unless accompanied by
their parents. Drug stores and all
public places except hotels are
closed Saturday night at 11 o'clock
and are not opened until 6 o'clock
Monday morning. This rule was
inaugurated in 1882, when Hayti
became a Republic.

Mr. Swack Hanner gave a talk
to a large audience at the Presby-
terian church on Sunday morning
which was enjoyed by many while
about an equal number took the
reverse view of the matter. His
ideas of our civilization are pecu-
liar, and to us he appears very
narrow in his views. However, if
we take into consideration his
breeding and early training, prob-
ably we would find he is living as
high a life as could be expected of
him, and he is to be congratulated
upon his achievements, even
though his ideas do not meet our
approval in all respects. It is well
that our people see and hear him
in order that we may get a clearer
idea of the class of people to whom
missionaries are sent.
