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MANY WILL COME WEST

Through many sources of information it is learned that there will be a large immigration from the middle west states this fall, caused principally by the excessive hot weather and failure of crops in a number of these states, including Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Nebraska, Iowa and Illinois. Owing to the worst drought experienced in many years, a light corn crop seems to be about all that has been raised over a great area of that section of the country, and in consequence, there will be many people coming to Oregon, California and Washington. Should land values be kept within the bounds of reason, these states will secure these people, but if property be held too high large numbers will be driven back on account of their inability to get a location.

As a matter of course, lands along the coast where crop failures have never been known since the first settlers arrived in these states will always bear higher prices than those similarly located in the states first mentioned, at the same time they may be boosted out of reason here and these good people bluffed out and return, not being willing to pay this great difference. It would be a good thing if many of our large land owners would break up their large holdings into small tracts and meet these good people half way on prices and give them a chance to help us build up the coast section to a high standard of civilization, cultivation, etc., and assist it in holding the position in which it rightfully belongs during years to come.

Russia's Premier Dies of Wound.

Kieff, Sept. 18.—Shot through the lungs by Bogrof, an alleged anarchist, as he sat in the opera house here, Premier Stolypin of Russia succumbed to his wounds today.

The dying prime minister gave a fine display of courage as the end drew on. He made light of his own sufferings. His last hours were occupied in giving his official aides final advice as to how to make real Russians of the people in the outlying provinces of the empire.

His only comment to his physicians on his own condition was: "I feel death is coming and I am content."

The police today arrested 150 associates of the assassin, Bogrof, whom they believe were implicated in the plot.

Fearing that Stolypin's death would result in Jewish massacres, there was a wholesale exodus of Jews today as soon as his demise became known.

The authorities believe that the assassin, Bogrof, was employed by a coalition of Jews and Poles, who were opposing Stolypin's Russianization plans.
