CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION AT EUGENE

The grand jury, which convened
on Wednesday of this week to fin-
ish up the work begun at the June
term of circuit court, adjourned
this afternoon after returning a
number of indictments and report-
ing "not a true" bill in a number
of cases, including that of Paul
Thomsen, who ran over Paul He-
bert with an automobile a few days
ago and killed him. Thomsen will
be taken to Portland to be tried
for larceny of the automobile,
which belonged to Dr. Homer I.
Keeney.

The indictments returned by the
grand jury are as follows:
Harry Love, charged with as-
sault and battery.

H. M. McCoy, obtaining money
under false pretenses.

Indictments against two men for
violating the local option law, but
as their arrest has not been effec-
ted, their names are not made pub-
lic.

The cases in which "not a true
bill" were reported are as follows:
J. M. Jetson; charged with rape;
Pearley E. Lewis, charged with
assault with a dangerous weapon;
John Wojcik and Morris Leder-
man, charged with the larceny of
some copper wire; Bert Mansell
and Mrs. Julia VanHousen, charged
with adultery and Paul Thom-
sen, charged with manslaughter.

The grand jury's final report is
of the usual form stating that the
jury has examined all crimes com-
mitted and triable that have come
to its notice and have made pre-
sentments thereof as provide by
law, finding indictments in those
cases where all the evidence would
seem to justify conviction; that the
jury has examined the county jail
and the county offices and found
them kept in good condition.

The jury consisted of Jeremiah
Day, foreman; Warner C. Waite,
Henry A. Kompp, Geo. Collier,
Geo. C. Widmer, William Hogate
and Wesley Whittaker.

A new jury will be chosen at the
beginning of the regular term week
after next.—Eugene Guard.

Rockefeller, descendant of kings,
is the latest Descending directly
from the first three earls of Lin-
coln, and from the early kings, of
England, Scotland, France and
Spain, before them, the Rockefel-
ler pedigree is now proved worthy
of a place in the register of the
Groton Avery clan.

Verification of Rockefeller's race
is made by the College of Heraldry,
at London, and an official certi-
ficate of descent, from the kings and
earls, today is possession of the oil
magnate. Elroy M. Avery, a
Cleveland historian, investigated
the matter.
