Pioneer Farmer is Dead at Cottage Grove.

George McCoy, a pioneer of this section, passed away at his home in Gowdville one mile west of this city Friday. He had lived for over 30 years in this part of Oregon, where he followed farming the greater portion of his life.

Mr. McCoy was born in Indiana on September 10, 1841, and when 18 years of age he came to California by way of Cape Horn. After a 20-year residence in the Golden State he moved to Oregon. Besides a wife he leaves three sons and two daughters to mourn his death. The funeral service was held at the family residence and interment took place in the I. O. O. F. Cemetery.
