S. T. Nelson Killed by Blast

S. T. Nelson, well known here, having once owned what is now known as the Spray farm, and having lived many years in this valley, was instantly killed one day the latter part of last week by being in close proximity to a blast which exploded, he being unaware of his danger.

It seems that Mr. Nelson was passing along a street where some work was in progress on which blasting was required. As he came near one of the men on the job stopped him and also a party in an auto and held them until a blast exploded, and then Mr. Nelson and the others proceeded. The auto went fast enough that it was out of harm's way, and the man who had stopped Mr. Nelson was at a safe distance but the gait at which Mr. Nelson traveled took him right to the spot where a second blast went off, snuffing out his life in an instant. His son, John Nelson, of near Eugene, went to Portland and looked after the remains.

Change in Business Firm.

On last Friday Mr. C. W. Wallace purchased the interest of Mr. D. H. Hemenway in the large general merchandise store of the Rees-Wallace Co., Inc. This gives Mr. Wallace entire control of the business, having now all but two shares of the stock.

Wallace and Hemenway secured the stock owned by Mr. Rees and have continued the business together up to the change which occurred on last Friday.

This firm has grown very rapidly and at present is one of the largest stores in the city.
