English Glee Singers Coming

On Thursday evening, November 23rd, Cottage Grove will be favored with a high-class entertainment of a novel nature, and one seldom, if ever seen in these parts before. We refer to the Royal English Glee Singers and Bell Ringers. Arrangements have been made by the Knights of Pythias and the Woodmen of the World for this company to occupy the Armory Hall day after tomorrow night, and we bespeak for them a liberal patronage.

At other cities along the line this company has been pronounced first-class in every respect, in fact, the best of its kind that has ever been in these parts.

The company is under the direction of Mr. Gieggle who has made a special study of hand bell ringing, and has got together the finest combination of bell ringers in the country, whose performances on the bells are exceptionally fine.

Their songs with bell accompaniments are a decided novelty, while the vocal work of the double quartette is another very strong feature. Mr. Gieggle has recently introduced another novelty, a piccolo solo with bell accompaniment.

The repertoire of the company includes sufficient material for two or three evenings' entertainment without repetitions.

The price of admission is 50 cents, 35 cents and 25 cents. Season reserved seat tickets, good for the three entertainments, can be secured for \$1.25.

This is the first of a course of three entertainments to be given in this city by the Brett Lyceum Bureau under the auspices of the K. P. and W. O. W. lodges.

The second number will be the Virginia Warblers, January 8th. The third number will be Alvah Green, humorous entertainer, February 9th.

Last Tuesday evening one of the most up to date banquets ever held in this city by a young peoples society was participated in by about 40 of the members and friends of the Laura Hefty Bible class of the M. E. Sunday School Mrs. F. D. Wheeler, teacher of the class then open the doors of her home for the occasion. The evening was begun by a visit to the gallery which contained many amusing subjects.

Big Land Deal Closed

The twelve hundred acre farm northeast of town known as the Harding place went into new hands on Saturday afternoon through the agency of Rev. J. L. Beatty, of near this city. The purchasers are J. E. Thomas, of California, and H. C. Kinney, of Creswell. The purchase price of the farm was \$75,000.

We understand that the place will be cut up into small tracts and improved to the highest degree, mainly as orchard tracts, it being admirably located for the production of fruits of all kinds.

This will go with many other moves for the more closely occupying the lands surrounding this city which will be largely to the advantage of the entire community, particularly so if a considerable portion should be planted to fruits which prove a support for our dryer. It will also mean homes and labor for a large number of good citizens, many of whom are constantly moving to the country adjacent to Cottage Grove.

Two lectures on the Panama canal by U. LeRoi Upson who has spent three years in the canal zone promises to be the greatest treat of the season for those who enjoy high-class and refined entertainment.

The first lecture, "The Panama Canal, Its Construction and Its Relation to the Pacific Coast States," is given tonight at the High School assembly room. The second, entitled, "Panama, Its History, Its People and Their Customs" will be given Friday, November 24th. These lectures are illustrated by the use of a large number beautifully colored slides.

Attendance at these lectures will give you an opportunity to familiarize yourself with largest undertaking of modern times, and one that means more to the Pacific coast states than any project that has ever been thought of, or that there is opportunity for, and it is one but few people have thought much about and know but little concerning. This entertainment is given under the auspices of the High School, and should receive a liberal patronage from all.

Rowe, Misses Mabel Greenwood, Mabel Iverson and Lola Wilson, all of whom were teachers of the town school. Also Miss Mildred Pringle and Miss Atha Widdersheim were in the party. Miss Mildred Pringle, appeared on the program twice, each time being applauded very highly.
