IN MEMORIAM.

Comrade J. E. McKibben, was born at Marietta, Washington County, Ohio, March 74, 1837. Died at his son's Frank A. McKibben near Cottage Grove, Oregon, Oct. 30, 1911. Age 74 years, 7 months, 25 days.

In early boyhood he migrated to Illinois and lived near Albion, Edwards county where on August 12, 1860 in the Christian Church he was joined in holy matrimony with Miss Velina Sperry of the same county. About the time that Lincoln made his second call which was for three years men, their first child was born, but being of a truly patriotic family the father with seven other brothers all enlisted. So many men enlisted in Illinois that they could not all get in the quota for that state so their company went to Kansas and was mustered as company B 2nd Kansas, Cav. He was afterward transferred to company C 3rd Kansas, Artillery, and served in Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas, serving a little over three years, being discharged in 1864.

Of the eight brothers seven returned from the war. One who was a Chaplain was wounded and died in the army.

He was from a remarkable family ten boys and four girls, all of whom are dead but one sister, living at Amboy county, Minn. After serving in the army in the spring of 1863 he and wife went to Minnesota to make a home. They were on a steamboat going up the Mississippi when they heard of Lincoln's assassination. Lived in Minnesota until 1877 when they moved to Iowa and lived there one year, moving to Kansas in 1878, and lived at or near Junction City where in 1890 his wife died.

Deceased leaves to mourn him as their father six sons and one daughter. The sons are all present, excepting Henry who is in Insane asylum. Frank A., M. A., J. E., J. J., H. H. and H. S.

McKibben. The daughter, Mrs. Ida Clark lives at Junction City, Kansas.

Comrade McKibben came to Oregon, 1901 and has lived at or near Cottage Grove, Oregon, since that time.

He was a member of Appomattox Post, No. 34, Department of Oregon.
