It is not knowledge that so ele-

Mill for Blue River Mine on the Way

W. S. Standish and Charles A.
Phelps, who are now largely inter-
ested in the Treasure Mining prop-
erty in the Blue River district, left
Eugene by stage this morning for
the district, after having transacted
business here and telegraphed
inquiries as to the whereabouts of
the new ore mill which they recent-
ly ordered from Los Angeles. It
seems that it was shipped some
time ago, but they have lost track
of it. A telegram was received
this morning at the Griggs hotel,
after they had left on the stage,
with the information that the mill
was shipped on December 1, and
had been delivered at the Albers
dock in Portland. The message
was transmitted by telephone to
Messrs. Standish and Phelps to
Walterville and delivered to them
when the stage reached that vil-
lage.

The mill will be sent up from
Portland as soon as possible, and
will be taken to the mine. This
machine will extract the gold from
the ores by a different system from
that of the stamp mill, and it is be-
lieved by those interested in the
property that it will be a success
in the treatment of the low grade
ore that exists in the Blue River
district. The ordinary stamp mill
is unable to save a large percent-
age of the gold found in the ore
there.

The Treasure mine was former-
ly owned by a syndicate of Eng-
lish capitalists and managed by
Mr. Hark, who built the mansion
now owned by F. L. Chambers on
East Eleventh street. The Eng-
lishmen expended a large sum of
money on the property, doing a
great deal of development work,
demonstrating its richness, but
through mismanagement or some
other reason the mine did not pay.
The people now in charge of the
property have every reason to be-
lieve that they will succeed in their
venture.—Eugene Guard.
