Portland had six inches of snow a day or so last week and it appeared for a time that another "silver thaw" was imminent. A Redmond bank has made arrangements to bring in several carloads of good dairy stock for ranchers of that section, following the same plan as that locality. Redmond, with a large area of irrigated alfalfa growing all about it should make an ideal dairy center.

The Portland float took the special prize at the New Year's Tournament of Roses at Pasadena, California, for being the finest float in the parade. The prize offered was regarded as not worthy of the occasion and a special one was purchased—a beautiful epergne—of artistic design and workmanship.

Good roads throughout Oregon will be the chief topic discussed by annual convention of county judges and commissioners of the state, which will be held in the Portland Commercial Club convention hall December 12-14. Road legislation will be considered, with a view to permanent highway construction throughout the state.

Dr. Max Steller, surgeon at Mount Sinai Hospital, Philadelphia, has discovered that the white lining or membrane of egg shells can be used with success as a substitute for human skin in grafting operations. This, it seems, may revolutionize the methods of treating scalds, burns and all injuries where skin grafting is necessary.

Four big realty deals during the last week, in different parts of the state, involving over \$1,500,000, show the faith eastern capitalists have in Oregon. A tract in Southern Vanhull county, embracing 2300 acres, brought \$250,000; 50,000 acres in Klamath county sold for \$300,000; 1200 acres in Baker county brought \$250,000, and a big tract of timber in the Sumpter Forest Reserve sold for \$500,000.

The new hotel which was recently built at Divide and which Mr. Burkett had just moved his piano and a portion of his goods into, burned down last Saturday night under circumstances very much like those under which the new store burned there last fall. The loss is upwards of \$1000 with \$500 insurance. There is reason to think that these fires were set as they both started under conditions impossible for it to have been accidental. It is too bad that such feelings exist in that neighborhood, and it is hoped that the people who take such measures to get even will think better in the future and refrain from such action.
