Good Roads.

Especially interesting in a time such as the present, when discussion of the merits of national and other trunk-highways is so widely current, was the speech made the other day by Frank Brauch Riley, vice-president of the Pacific Highway Association for Oregon, at a meeting of Oregon Country Judges and Commissioners, held in Portland. Mr. Riley said in part:

"It has been stated that Pacific Highway is essentially a scenic highway for the motor-traveller. The road passes through a fertile region, and the use to be made of it by those who live in the country through which it passes for the purposes of communication, social intercourse, commerce, the parcels-post, and the rural free delivery, will probably always exceed its utility as a route for pleasure travel merely. However, there is nothing more productive as the investment in a tourist. Given an opportunity to penetrate into the heart of the Western country by an all-the-year-round road, there is no over-estimating the numbers in which they will come.

"The Pacific Coast is the recreation ground of America. Here we have all the enchanting varieties of climate, the fruitful valleys the tumbling mountain streams, the forests of pointed fir, the towering mountains in the icy clutch of glaciers all indeed, of which Europe can boast. Pacific Highway is helping to draw the curtain from the face of the wonders; is tempting the American tourist to see America first; is enticing prospective small land owner to find out for himself the opportunities of the west, as he never can discover them by a journey made over the railroad alone.

"The Pacific Highway will promote traffic between the cities, help the farmer to market his produce, and will encourage the tourist to come among us.

"Many have the idea that the trunk railroad which are being constantly extended will lessen our dependence on common or county roads, and that we will presently have little need of the Pacific Highway or of any other important road for the movement of traffic. But the traffic census of European countries which are networked alike with railroads and superb systems of wagon-roads show that the movement of freight over the wagon-roads is one and one-half times greater than all the tonnage moved by all the railroads."

Gift to O. A. C.

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 15.—Mrs. Clara Waldo of Portland, member of the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural College and patroness of the Waldo Hall Club, composed of residents of the girls' dormitory, has just doubled her annual gift of \$100 to the club. The money in previous years was used to give an entertainment to the faculty and students in the form of a reception and dance. This year the college has grown so large that the crowd made it necessary to give the reception only and omit the dancing. That the girls might have this pleasure also, Mrs. Waldo has provided funds for a dancing party, which will be given in the near future.

In an address at the college Friday Mrs. Waldo said: "There are two reasons why our reputation is so high in California. The first is our standard of sound and scientific training; and the second that parents, even in the far south, are not afraid to trust their boys and girls to the college because of the healthy social atmosphere."

Mrs. Waldo has signified her intention of making an annual endowment of \$100 for prizes for the young women doing work of merit. The girls in this year's senior class have been asked to decide the conditions upon which such prizes are to be awarded.
