Two Valuable Crops

A farmer in South Dakota hauled in a load of alfalfa seed to his nearest market and he carried home a check for \$1008.30. The weight of the load of seed was 5931 pounds and it was sold for 17 cents a pound. That load was grown on less than twenty acres of land in the vicinity of Mitchell that state. Certainly a pretty good-sized income from a piece of land of that size, and its owner was considerably elated over the result of his farming--and besides he had the alfalfa straw left to feed to his stock, and at the same time the land had been benefited by the additional fertility that the alfalfa affords instead of being depleted in strength as it would have been had some grain of other hay crop been harvested from it.

A single wagon load of timothy seed was sold at Sandstone, Minnesota, recently, by a farmer for \$1,092.50; it weighed 4370 pounds, and was raised on ten acres of land which was sowed ten years ago on top of the wildsod. It has never been plowed. The farmer is an invalid, unable to leave his chair and therefore must hire all his work done.--Pacific Home-stead.

Standard Oil Fined

Buffalo, Jan. 23.--The Standard Oil Co. of New York, was fined \$55,000 by Judge Hazel of the United States district court, today for 143 violations of the interstate commerce law in accepting rate concessions during 1904 and 1905 from the Pennsylvania and New York Central Railroad on shipments of oil from Olean, N. Y., to Burlington, Vt.

The maximum possible fine would have been \$2,860,000.
