POSTAL SAVINGS BANK

Local Post Office Will Receive Depos-
its April 1

Cottage Grove will, on and af-
ter April 1, be "on the map" as a
station of the Postal Savings Sys-
tem of the United States.

Accounts may be opened and
deposits made by any person of
the age of 10 years or over in his
or her own name and by a married
woman in her own name and free
from any interference or control by
her husband. No person can have
more than one account at one time.

No person may open a postal-
savings account at any post office
who is not a patron of that office.

All accounts must be opened in
person by the depositor or his au-
thorized representative. After op-
ening an account a depositor may
forward subsequent deposits to the
post office by mail.

Deposits will be accepted only
from individuals, and no account
will be opened in the name of any
corporation, association, society,
firm, or partnership, or in the names
of two or more persons jointly.

No account will be opened in the
name of one person in trust for or
on behalf of another person or per-
sons.

The service of the Postal Sav-
ings System is free, and no charge
or fee is collected or required in
connection with the opening of an
account or the withdrawal of mon-
ey deposited.

No person connected with the
Post Office Department or the pos-
tal service is permitted to disclose
the name of any depositor or give
any information concerning an ac-
count except to the depositor him-
self, unless directed to do so by
the Postmaster General.

When a person applies to open
an account he must furnish the
necessary information for the post-
master or his representative to fill
out an application, which he will
then be required to sign. If the
applicant signs by mark his signa-
ture must be witnessed by a dis-
interested person.

Deposits are evidenced by postal-
savings certificates issued in
fixed denominations of \$1, \$2, \$5,
\$10, \$20, \$50, and \$100, each
bearing the name of the depositor,
the number of his account, the
date of issue, the name of the de-
pository office, and the date on
which interest begins. The post-
master or his representative will
make out a duplicate of each cer-
tificate issued, which the depositor
will be required to sign and which
the postmaster will retain in his
records.

No account may be opened for
less than \$1, nor will fractions of
a dollar be accepted for deposit.

No person is permitted to depos-
it more than \$100 in any one cal-
endar month nor to have a total
balance to his credit at one time
of more than \$500 exclusive of ac-
cumulated interest.

Savings certificates can not be
transferred or negotiated and will
be payable only to the person to
whom issued.

Interest will be allowed on all
deposits at the rate of 2 per cent
per annum, computed on each sav-
ings certificate separately, and pay-
able annually. No interest
will be paid on money which re-
mains on deposit for a fraction of
a year only.

A depositor will be permitted to
exchange the whole or any part of
his deposits in sums of \$20, \$40,
\$60, \$80, \$100, or multiples of \$100
up to and including \$500, into
United States registered or coupon
bonds bearing interest at the rate
of 2½ per cent per annum, pay-
able semiannually, and redeemable
at the pleasure of the United States
after one year from date of issue,
both principal and interest pay-
able 20 years from such date in Un-
ited States gold coin. Such ex-
change may be made under date
of January 1 and July 1 of each
year, provided such bonds are
then available.

Savings deposits converted into
bonds are not counted as a part
of the maximum of \$500 allowed one
depositor, and there is no limita-
tion upon the amount of available
postal-savings bonds which may be
acquired by a depositor.

Postal-savings bonds are ex-
empt from all taxes or duties of
the United States, as well as from
taxation in any form by or under
State, municipal, or local author-
ity.

A letter from Glen D. Hart at
Deadwood, South Dakota, under
date of March 3, appears in the
Roseburg Review of last Thursday.
For the reason that everything Mr.
Hart says relative to this region
might be applied to Cottage Grove
—only more so—we print the let-
ter. He says: "I arrived in Dead-
wood last Monday, found plenty
of ice and snow, quite a change
from flowers, green grass and
strawberries, as you have it in and
around Roseburg. If the people
of the United States knew what an
elegant climate you have, Rose-
burg would have one million peo-

It behooves every citizen of Rose-
burg and Douglas County to join
the Boosters' Club and live on
Booster street and get busy and

fellows, and on the west by hospi-
tality. This is the way it looks to
me, and I am telling the people
this every day, because I fully be-
lieve it myself. A great future is
in store for Roseburg if she will
boost for good roads all over the
county. Give us good, first class
roads and I will put a family on
every ten acres in your county, if
given a chance. I will long re-
member my last visit to your city,
and am sorry that I am not in
your midst today."

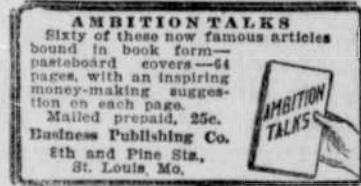
