Spencer to Represent Oregon

Carlton Spencer of Cottage Grove
was the successful contestant in
the final oratorical tryout at the
University of Oregon, Eugene,
Monday night, and will represent
Oregon in the inter-state oratorical
contest scheduled for May 25 at
Missoula, Montana. The subject
of his oration in the contest of
Monday night was "The Rust on
Our Legal Machinery." Leon Ray
on "Men Who Have Reverted to
Type" and William St. John with
"Counting the Cost" made second
and third places respectively.

Mr. Spencer was the winner in
the inter-collegiate contest last year
and college debate champion two
years ago. He is a real orator,
and his Cottage Grove friends pre-
dict a victory for him at Missoula.

The winner of the inter-state
oratorical contest last year was Chas.
W. Robinson, a Portland boy, rep-
resenting the University of Oregon.
The colleges represented by orators
in the inter-state contest last year
were the Universities of Oregon,
Montana and Washington. This
year the contesting colleges will
include, in addition to those en-
tered last season, Idaho and Whit-
man college.

Buried at Cottage Grove

Langdon Morse, a former Cot-
tage Grove business man, who
moved to Portland in 1897, was
brought here for burial Tuesday,
March 19, having died at Portland
the day before after a lingering ill-
ness from cancer of the stomach.
The funeral was held Tuesday af-
ternoon from the M. E. church un-
der the auspices of the G. A. R.
Interment was made in the A. F.
& A. M. and Odd Fellows' ceme-
tery.

The deceased leaves a widow
and two daughters, Mrs. W. C.
Swan of Mt. Vernon, Washington,
and Mrs. William Veatch of this
city.

Mr. Morse was born in Lamol
county, Vermont, April 22, 1844.
He enlisted in Co. K, 26th Iowa
Volunteer Infantry, Aug. 15, 1862,
being honorably discharged June
27, 1865. He moved to Oregon in
January, 1891, and came to Cot-
tage Grove in 1895, following a
residence at Crawfordville and
Springfield. He lived in Port-
land from 1897 until the time of
his death.

Calapooya Springs Items

Sunshine, rain and some mud is
what we are getting just now. The
grass and grain are growing fine.
Every one is busy preparing for
seedling. Drying days will pre-
pare the ground for spring crops
and early gardens.

There will be a mass meeting at
the London Hall Thursday at one
p. m. for the purpose of consider-
ing the road question, the Pacific
Highway, the electric line, and
the opening up of a trail across
the low divide across the Calapooy-
a range near the Black Butte
Mines, which has been surveyed,
and all the elevations taken. This
is very low and the most practical
route for the electric line, it being
several miles nearer than any other
route and much the best grade,
besides having vast quantities of
fine timber, the fertile valleys on
either side of the Calapooyas, the
Calapooya Spring, the Black Butte
mines and many other natural ad-
vantages not found on any other
route.

The telephone business is another
subject that will be discussed.
The patrons of the telephone in
this section think it is time for the
farmers to take some action to-
ward running an independent central,
which they think they can do
at a big saving. Their object is
to unite all the independent lines
and run their own business, but at
Cottage Grove and other points.
Every one come and help the good
work.

Move to Create New County

A move to organize a new coun-
ty from the western part of Lane
and Douglas is being discussed
and active steps to bring this about
may be started before long, says
the Florence West. This matter
was first proposed some 20 years
ago but owing to the small num-
ber of inhabitants and the small
amount of taxable property, it was
given up at that time. Two years
ago the question was again agitat-
ed and considerable work was
done toward bringing it before the
voters at the election of that year,
but the matter was allowed to lapse
as developments showed that it
was an inopportune time. With
the increase of business and the
development of this portion of the
state, comes the feeling that coun-
ty affairs can be better managed
at short range and that the inter-
ests of the people of this section
demand that a new county be
formed in this part of the state.
It is the general opinion that taxes
would be no higher and the con-
venience in transacting business
would be worth a great deal.

Needed

Oregon is to have a state book-
let for information and guidance of
inquirers who want to know exact
facts regarding opportunities and
resources. Governor West has
made this possible by releasing the
\$25,000 appropriation enacted by
the last legislature. The booklet
will be compiled by C. C. Chap-
man, State Immigration Agent,
with the co-operation of the State
Board of Immigration, the Oregon
Agricultural College, Oregon De-
velopment League and the com-
mercial clubs of all the sections on
the State of Oregon.

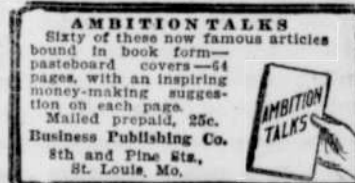
