On April 17, 18 and 19 an ex-

**A State Booklet**

State Immigration Agent C. C.  
Chapman, of Portland, is sending  
a letter to the secretaries of the  
commercial clubs of the state,  
the mayors, or chief official  
of every incorporated town and to  
the boards of county commissioners  
asking for information to be used  
in the state booklet to be published  
under the auspices of the Oregon  
Immigration Commission and over  
the seal of the state. Each com-  
munity will thus be made respon-  
sible for the information that goes  
out about itself. The questions  
ask for the nature of the agricul-  
tural opportunities and the many  
other advantages of the commu-  
nity. When compiled, the reports  
received will form a condensed en-  
cyclopedia of information which  
the inquirer about Oregon will  
want most to know. If further  
particulars are desired, he will be  
given directions where to write to  
get them. The booklet will be of  
64 pages, without illustrations ex-  
cept some diagram maps of the  
state, and will have a circulation  
of 200,000. The space apportion-  
ed to each county will be on a joint  
basis of population and area, al-  
though, Multnomah will not be  
given any more space than any  
other county.
