University Case as Reviewed

Salem, April 24.—The supreme court yesterday reversed the decision of the Marion county circuit court in the case of S. H. Friendly against Ben W. Olcott, secretary of state, the case involving the appropriations for the University of Oregon. In accordance with its decision, the referendum is upheld and the question of the appropriations will be placed on the ballot at the general election. This will tie up the appropriation for the University until the voters have a chance to decide the question.

The suit was brought by Mr. Friendly on the grounds of alleged fraud in circulating the referendum petitions. Judge Galloway in the circuit court upheld the contentions of the plaintiff and issued a permanent injunction against having the title of the referendum placed on the ballot.

Justice Burnett gave the opinion reversing the findings of the lower court, there being no dissenting opinion. In brief it as follows:

This is the suit to enjoin the secretary of state from certifying to the county clerks the ballot title formulated by the attorney general to be printed on the ballot for the election to be held in November, 1912, whereby the electors may vote on the referendum of house bill No. 510 passed at the twenty-sixth regular session of the legislative assembly.

OFFICIAL COUNT OF REPUBLICAN VOTES

The total vote cast for each republican candidate at the primaries in Lane county last Friday has been footed up. The result of the election is found to be the same as the unofficial figures given except in the case of the county commissionership, George M. Hawley, of Cottage Grove, winning over Hugh M. Price, of Eugene, by 62 votes. The race between I. B. Cushman, of Acme, and M. Vernon Parsons, of Eugene, for state representative, was close, the latter winning by 29 votes. The democratic votes are being counted, but no totals will be available till some time later. The republican figures are as follows:

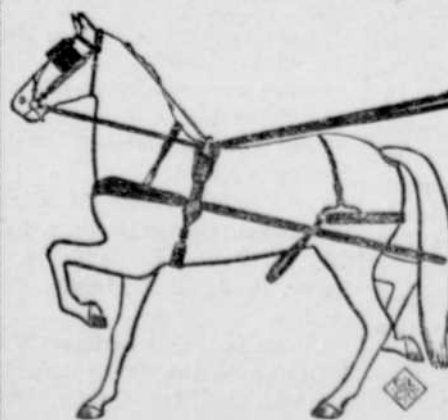
