Florence News.

The first scow load of rock delivered at the jetty this year was taken down the river last Friday.

A crew of men are now busy at the quarry getting out rock and loading it on the scows on which it is transported to the mouth of the river. Here the rock is loaded on cars and taken out on the tram way where it is dumped into the jetty wall.

The steamer Robarts makes a trip up the river nearly every day with an empty scow and returns with another one loaded with rock. More scows will be available for this work before long and the rock will then be handled more rapidly.

Monday morning a crew of men were put at work moving lumber from the barges, on which it was brought from the mills, to the yard at Florence where two large rock scows are to be built at once—Florence West.

Almost 3,000 cars loaded with potatoes will be shipped out of the Wharton, Texas district between May 1 and June 20, if the estimates of railroad men are correct. Several of the local commercial agents have been in Wharton looking over the acreage. It was found that 8,180 acres planted in potatoes are tributary to the Southern Pacific, and that 2,360 acres are tributary to the Santa Fe. They figure that the potatoes raised on four acres will fill a car, and that the entire crop of the Wharton district will require 3,000 cars this year. Competition is keen for the handling of these cars.—Farm and Fireside.
