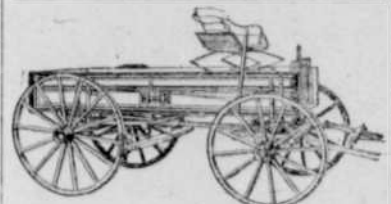

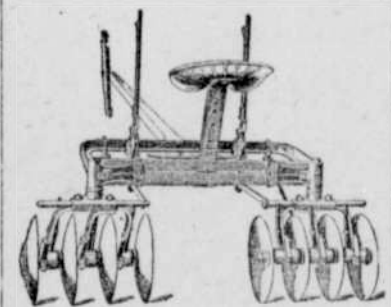

Here is a reversible extension disc harrow. It can be used for more than a dozen different things on the farm. It is a good cultivator. If you use it on stubble before plowing you will find it will plow about a third easier. Run it nearly straight over your field of growing grain though it be six inches high—if you try it on a small piece of grain, you will see that your land needs that crust broken. Use it in your orchard, run it over your plowed field. It will cut up the big clods that you turned under with the plow. Twenty acres of land well worked is worth 40 acres half worked.
