There was a time when the vogue of "Pinafore" was simply amazing. It was not copyrighted and after its success in London it was pirated in the United States. This piracy was the initial cause of Gilbert's hatred of America and Americans.
However, if America did not send him its dollars, it was quite ready to spread his fame, says the Bookman. Church choirs added "Pinafore" to their repertoires, and it is recorded that 100,000 barrel organs were constructed to play nothing else. Here is an ironical note from a newspaper of the time:
"At present there are 42 companies playing 'Pinafore.' Companies formed after 6 p. m. yesterday are not included."

Its catch phrase, "What, never? Well, hardly ever!" was deadly. It is told, for instance, that one editor barred his staff from using it.
"It occurred 20 times in as many articles yesterday. Never let me see it used again." "What, never?" was the unanimous question. "Well, hardly ever," replied the wretched man.
The readiness of W. S. Gilbert's wit is well illustrated by this story told of him. He and F. C. Burnard, the editor of Punch, were guests at the same dinner table where a wise host placed the rival humorists at opposite ends of the room in the hope of distributing equally the witty table talk.

Continual shouts of laughter rose from Gilbert's corner until Burnard, after ineffectual attempts to arouse a similar jocularity in his immediate circle and unable to conceal his chagrin, leaned forward and said in his most sarcastic manner:
"I suppose Mr. Gilbert is telling some of those funny stories which he occasionally sends to Punch but which don't appear."
To which Gilbert dryly replied: "I don't know who sends the funny stories to Punch, but it's very true they don't appear."

Sponge Cake.
Three eggs, a quarter of a pound of flour, four tablespoonfuls of sugar, grated rind of half a lemon. Sift the flour on to a piece of paper, adding one teaspoonful of baking powder and sift again. Put the eggs into a basin and beat them for fully ten minutes, add the sugar and beat for twenty minutes. Stir in the flour, baking powder and lemon rind as lightly as possible. Butter a cake tin, then dust it over with flour. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin, and bake in a very moderate oven for about one hour. This mixture may be baked in small gem pans if preferred.

DEFEAT INSURGENTS
Mexican Rebels Leave Hundreds Dead on Battle Field.

Orozco Abandons Cannon and Retreats Towards Base—Trainload of Supplies Is Destroyed.

At the Federal Front, Conejos, Mexico, May 13.—Twelve hours of brisk fighting on the desert plains 300 miles south of the American border between a force of 5000 rebels under General Orozco and an equally strong body of federals under General Huerta resulted today in a decided advantage to the government.

The fighting was begun at daybreak, and at nightfall the sandy mesa between here and Yermo, 14 miles north, where the insurgents were gradually forced back, were covered with dead and wounded.
Nearly 500 are believed to have been killed and wounded on both sides. A courier brought the information that General Trucey Aubert, the dashing federal commander, had been shot in the leg.
The rebels abandoned ten cannon and much ammunition in their retreat. General Joaquin Telles, who had been stationed in the rear of Huerta's vanguard, at noon was sent around to the eastward to flank the rebels and cut off their retreat. Federal headquarters assert tonight that the rebels are completely surrounded and that the second day of fighting will prove equally decisive.

This town, only yesterday occupied by the vanguard of the rebels, was riddled with bullets when the federals galloped into it at sunset. Over the foothills to the north the insurgents could be seen retreating.
General Huerta has been receiving many telegrams of congratulation on the outcome of the day's fighting. Should the advantage gained today be followed by equal success tomorrow, the federal leaders are confident it will mean the annihilation of the insurgent army.
General Huerta considers it probable, however, that the rebels will make their last stand at Escalon, their central base, 14 miles to the north, where they have built fortifications and trenches in the last fortnight.

It was the steady artillery fire of the government troops that dislodged the enemy. The aim of the federal gunners was true. They began to shell the rebel positions at daybreak. For a time the insurgents fired in volleys, and seven federal officers were wounded. Only a few hours, however, they withstood the fierce cannonading, and soon began to evacuate their positions.
General Telles arrived at nightfall with a detachment of 1500 men in the valley behind Conejos, where the vanguard of the rebels was gathered. It seems likely tonight that unless the rebels continue to fight desperately, a large number of prisoners will be taken when dawn breaks.

Flowers Deck Ship's Bed.
New York—Standing on the bridge of the Carmania in mid-ocean, Mrs. J. H. Loring, of New York and London, scattered flowers on the water of the Atlantic in memory of her husband, who lost his life on the Titanic.
When the Carmania, had arrived in latitude 41.16 and longitude 50.14, the nearest position to where the Titanic sank, Mrs. Loring, attired in deep mourning, was escorted to the bridge by Captain Dow. Five hundred cabin passengers stood on the decks as Mrs. Loring scattered the flowers on the sea. Men stood with heads bowed and uncovered, while some of the women passengers, touched by the widow's devotion, wept.

Ships Collide at Sea.
San Francisco—Badly waterlogged, the sailing schooner Mayflower was towed into this port by the steam schooner San Pedro, with which the Mayflower was in collision off Point Reyes. Captain Bendickson, of the San Pedro, was hurled to the deck by the force of the collision and his shoulder was dislocated. The San Pedro, which escaped injury, at once took the disabled vessel in tow. The San Pedro was bound for Eureka, and the Mayflower for Coquille, River, Oregon.

Strike Does Not Spread
San Francisco—The pressmen's strike in this city has not extended beyond the Examiner, which appeared Sunday morning with a four-page news section. At a meeting of the Publishers' association a proposal that all other newspapers of the city should cut down their issues to the same size as the Examiner did not carry and unless it should subsequently be put into effect, the understanding is that the strike will not spread.

Liner Sights Eight Icebergs.
New York—Icebergs in the Atlantic farther south than they have ever been seen before were reported by incoming steamers. The Cunard liner Carmania last Thursday sighted eight monster ice mountains in latitude 39.09 north, longitude 47.24 west, while the log of the French liner La Savoie recorded icebergs in latitude 39.15 north, 47.4 west.

BOAT DRILLS NOT HELD.
English Board of Inquiry Shows Apathy of Titanic Officers.

London—The apathy of the British public, which has been one of the features thus far of the board of trade inquiry into the Titanic disaster, was again demonstrated by the thin attendance when the commissioners under the presidency of Lord Mersey, resumed their investigation.
The first witness called was George Beauchamp, a fireman of the Titanic, who testified:
"I did not know which was my boat station. I heard that a list had been put up that morning, but I did not see it. None had been put up before. I did not know where to go, so I went up to the boat deck and to lifeboat No. 13, on the starboard side, where I helped to put in the women and children. There was an officer there and when the lifeboat was full he gave the order to lower away."

"There was between 60 and 70 in all in the boat which was put in charge of a stoker. There was no light, compass, provisions nor water in the boat."
Beauchamp testified that he had seen no boat drill on the Titanic.
Robert Hichens, quartermaster, testified that he was on duty on the bridge of the Titanic at 8 o'clock. He heard Second Officer Lightoller through the telephone give an order to the men in the crow's nest to keep a sharp lookout for ice and growlers.
Hichens went on duty at the wheel at 10 o'clock. He testified that the logbook showed the speed to have been 45 knots in two hours and that there was no change up to the time the Titanic struck the iceberg at 11:40.

"Would the lifeboats have been of any use at all if there had been a rough sea?" asked Lord Mersey.
The quartermaster replied emphatically: "I am sure they would not, my lord."

ANCIENT THRONE RESTORED
New York O'Connor 'Revives' Dynasty in Ireland.
New York—The O'Connors are to be kings in Ireland once more. Every student of Irish history knows that Roderick O'Connor was the last king of Ireland and Prince of Breffney, but future historians must record that it remained for Michael J. O'Connor, a Broadway saloonkeeper, to restore the clan to the regal grandeur which is theirs by right.

The new O'Connor dynasty is to be established on the banks of the River Shannon, where King Roderick O'Connor took his last stand and fought with his clan at his back. There it was, too, that Tom Moore sang "The Valley Lay Smiling Before Me."
The old estate of King Roderick, long since fallen into unfriendly hands, has been bought by Michael O'Connor, who restored the family fortune through the medium of two cafes in Broadway and one in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. The new "Prince of Breffney" has returned from Ireland and announced his purchase.

DOGGIE WAS SPRAYED.
Rich Mrs. Pullman Quits Honolulu Because Pet Is Mistreated.
San Francisco—Chagrined because the quarantine officials at Honolulu persisted in imposing hardships upon her high bred dog, Mrs. George M. Pullman, widow of the Pullman palace car magnate, cut her visit in the islands very short and returned on the Oceanic liner Sierra.
Mrs. Pullman explained that she had expected to pass another month in Honolulu and its environs, but that the quarantine officers took her pet spaniel away from her and gave it a course of spraying and disinfectants. Then the Honolulu newspapers took the matter up and gave it publicity, which was displeasing to Mrs. Pullman, and she decided to "cut" the paradise of the Pacific and hastened to leave, bag and baggage.
After many unsuccessful attempts to get her dog out of quarantine, she gave up in disgust and arranged with an agent there to send the spaniel upon the next steamer to San Francisco, and it will be forwarded by express to Chicago.

Kansas Women Confident.
Wichita, Kan.—Close to 1000 women from this and other states were in attendance at the twenty-ninth annual convention of the Kansas Equal Suffrage association here. Miss Jane Adams, of Chicago, and Rev. Olympia Brown Willis, president of the Wisconsin Equal Suffrage association, who took part with Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony and other leaders in the Kansas suffrage campaign a quarter of a century ago, are guests of honor. Speakers predicted that Kansas will grant suffrage next November.

Fish Prices Go Skyward.
Los Angeles—Because of a shortage of all kinds of deep-sea fish all along the Southern California coast, wholesale prices have taken a jump of nearly 100 per cent within the past few days, and may go still higher. Fishermen who have been in the channel for 30 years say the only reason they can give for the shortage is that tugs fishing with seines a mile long have destroyed many small fish and much spawn.

People Give Warship.
Stockholm, Sweden—The sum of \$3,360,000, subscribed by the public for construction of a battleship for the Swedish navy, was brought to the king by a deputation representing the donors. King Gustaf expressed profound gratitude for the magnificent gift.

WAYS OF SERVING CHEESE
Some Suggestions for the Housekeeper Who Wishes to Avoid Monotony.
The housekeeper who does not believe in monotony does not serve cheese in the same way two days in succession. A little planning will enable her to run three or four different kinds of cheese at the same time, keeping them all fresh by putting them in an airtight cold place.
As most cheeses spoil quickly it is well to buy in smaller portions, especially in warm weather. Some cheeses are so perishable that grocers will not handle them in summer, and they should not be bought unless to be eaten at once.
The same kind of cheese may be served in various forms. Take the popular cream cheese, probably more used than any other one make. If you pass it out in squares one day, the next mix it in balls sprinkled with parsley; again mix with chopped pimientos; or thin slightly with whipped cream, mix with chopped red peppers, and remold into a flat thin cake, which is passed whole.

Instead of serving bar-le-due and cream cheese separately, stir together into a mixture about the consistency of creamed butter and sugar.
Fried cheese balls are delicious served with plain lettuce and French dressing. Mix into the cheese chopped parsley, a dash of cayenne, a pinch of salt, and two drops of onion juice. Mold into balls, dip in egg and bread crumbs, and fry in boiling lard before serving.
Another fried cheese with lettuce is made of the English or ordinary American cheese cut in strips like French fried potatoes. Dip these in seasoned egg and bread crumbs and fry in deep fat when ready for use.

Sauce for Fricassee.
Stir together two tablespoonfuls of butter and one of flour previously mixed with a little milk. Add a pint of milk and white stock mixed in equal quantities; or a pint of milk alone. Add a sliced carrot, a chopped onion, a few sprigs of parsley and salt and pepper to taste. Put into the sauce whatever meat it is intended to fricassee and stew gently until tender. Remove the pieces into another saucepan, thicken with the yolks of two eggs, squeeze in the juice of half a lemon, pour over the meat and serve very hot.
